There were five fire alarms during the month of August, no damage resulting, according to the report of Fire Chief D. H. McDonald presented at last night's council meeting. Expenses of the department for the month totalled \$1,208.54, including \$1,151.33 in salaries. The usual inspections had been made and equipment was in good order.

Pursuant to a decision made two weeks ago, the bylaw providing for the construction of the new main sewer in Section Five was brought in at last night's council meeting and given its initial readings, another meeting of the council being called for noon Wednesday to finally reconsider and adopt it. The passage of the bylaw will permit of the work being proceeded with as soon as the engineer's department is in a position to do so.

A letter was read at last night's council meeting from Adair Carrs Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, enquiring if it would be possible to obtain the service of some person in the parks department to cut the grass and otherwise look after the soldiers' plot in Fairview Cemetery, for which work the chapter was prepared to pay a reasonable amount although it had already spent much in this connection. The matter was referred to the Board of Works with power to act.

### CELEBRATION OF CENTENARY OF HUDSON BAY CO. OCCUPATION IN CENTRAL B. C.

(continued from page 1)

pany's headquarters in such a way as to mark the limits of what he thought should be British territory on the north and south. "Then," said Mr. Sale, "he went back to Hudson's Bay and in the year 1828 made his second overland journey by a new route it was to consolidate the work he had commenced. It is the visit, that he made on that second journey, to Fort St. James one hundred years ago that we are commemorating today."

Fort St. James, which is situated 45 miles north of Vanderhoof, on the Canadian National Railways, between Jasper National Park and Prince Rupert is still a thriving fur trade post and the centre of an extensive big game and fishing area. The fort itself, the summer resort hotel, Douglas Lodge, and every other available accommodation on the shore of Stuart Lake have not been enough to take care of the crowds that have come for the celebration, and tents have of necessity been erected. In this respect, the white visitors are at one with the Indians who have poured in, a bizarre crew, from all parts of the country side, it is a big day for the Indians, bucks, squaws and paposes. They played their part in the pageant yesterday morning; in the afternoon they threw themselves fervently into sports and games, followed by their feast and a good old fashioned Indian dance, and the night was crowned with fireworks.

The whites were almost as enthusiastic as the natives over the squaws' horse races, the tugs of war, the snow shoe races, the dugout races on the lake, the dancing and ax-throwing competitions, and the exhibition of the old game of La hall. This was particularly so of the old chiefs, dances, when the braves made a glorious show in their buckskins, their Chilkat blankets, their feathers and their furs, and made a glorious noise with their throats, their rattles and their jingling thimbles. All the chiefs, and head men were presented to the governor and all received medals struck for the event.

In addition to that of Mr. Sale, addresses were delivered by Hon. Randolph Bruce, Lieut. Governor of British Columbia, Judge F. W. Howay, of New Westminster; Roderick Mackenzie, M.P.P., Williams Lake, B. C.; Rev. Father Coccoia of Fort St. James, and G. W. Allan, Winnipeg, chairman of the Canadian committee of the Hudson's Bay Company.

The Lieutenant-Governor declared that it was one of the greatest things the Stuart line had ever done when King Charles II presented the charter to the Hudson's Bay Company. He paid his "reverent homage to the pioneers, who were empire builders and statesmen," and declared that their stirring story, so closely woven with the early days of the province, was a great stimulus for the future, he expressed his gratitude to the company of adventurers for their glorious service to Canada and the Empire.

Members Tell of Holiday Experiences and Make Plans for Coming Season—Banquet Next Monday Evening

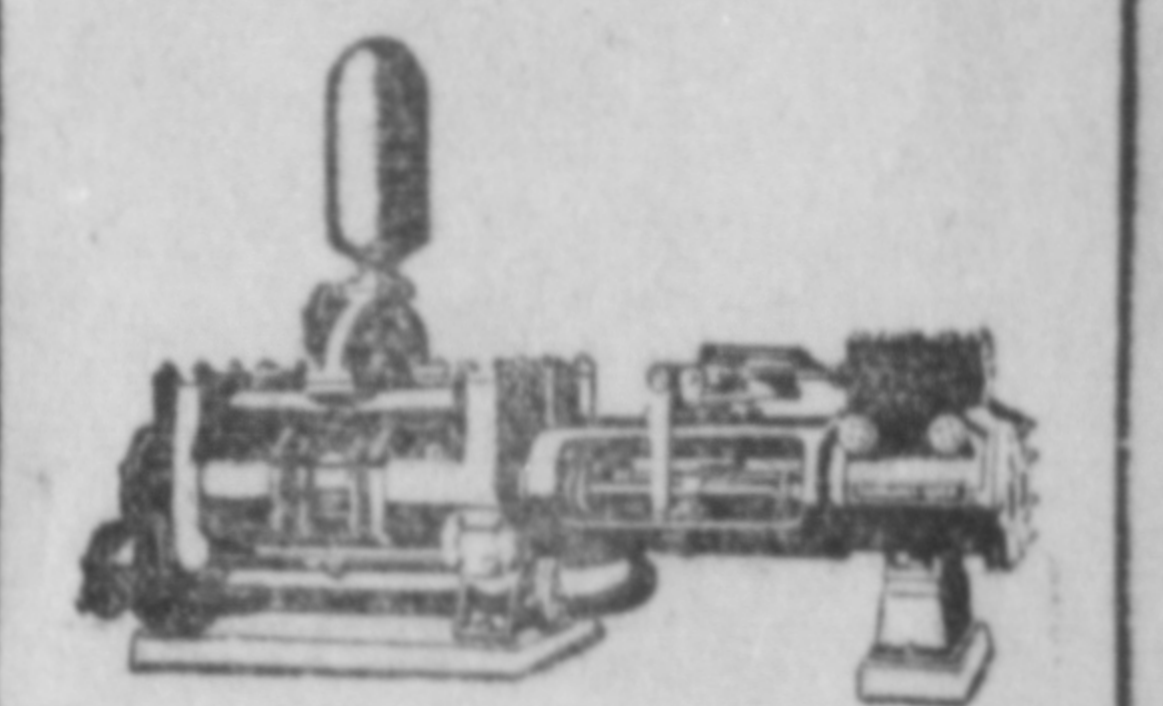
