That battle at the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada annual meeting at Port Arthur and the subsequent armistice will be beneficial to amateur sport throughout Canada. Dirty linen has been washed-and washed-not behind closed doors, but out in the open, and flung to the breeze to dry. If there has been rancor and acrimony it has all been laundered out, let us hope, and a better understanding arrived at all around. There is nothing to be gained by nursing grievances in such an organization as the A. A. U. of C. The whole trouble seemed to centre around the protest entered over the defeat of Fanny Rosenfeld by Betty Robinson, a representative of the U.S. On the broad principle of good sportsmanship it is inadvisable to protest when beaten, but there are extenuating circumstances at times, and when one feels that there has been deliberate discrimination it is notunwise, for the good of sport itself, to make objection in the prescribed and sportsmanlike way. But the matter of that protest only served to drag other more trivial matters into the discussion, and the whole unfortunate incident gathered momentum, as it were, until the final blow-off at Port Arthur. There is no doubt that the debate at the annual meeting will serve to clear the atmosphere, and prove generally beneficial. Judge Jackson of Lethbridge, ex-president of the A. A. 
ORANGE LADIES SUSTAIN DEFEAT


