Fee For Non-acceptances Ranged From Five Pounds Downwards According to Wealth

LONDON, Jan. 26 .- Discussing Leap Year, with 29 days in February, the Daily News says:

"On the face of it, it seems an ar-

bitrary arrangement. For its origin and explanation we must go back to Julius Caesar or to his astronomers, who. somewhere about 45 B.C., fixed the length of the year, as measured by the sun's transit, at 365 days 6 hours. The odd hours presented a difficulty which was overcome by ignoring them for three years, and, on the fourth year, adding four times six, or 24 hours, to the year's length. February 29 was not originally the added day, and is not even now regarded universally in that ight. In the Roman calendar the trick was worked by doubling the sixth day before the calends of March, that is February 24, the year for this reason being called "bissextile," a name still retained in the Latin countries of Europe "In the British Isles, however, it has been considered more reasonable, as it is certainly less confusing, to give February an extra day, rather than have two consecutive days bearing the same date The English term 'leap year' is almost self-explanatory. ON RAIL JOINTS

gineer Which is Said Will be Better and Cheaper

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Jan. 26. new kind of rails for railroads, said to embody the solution of several problems now confronting the railway builders and more economical and safer in use, has been invented by a Swedish gineer. The new rail consists of two; i.fferent parts, the foot and the head; joined together in zigzag fashion and in such a way as to eliminate the jolts when the wheels pass over the rail cints, thus ensuring long wear and durability while greatly reducing the risk of rail breaks. When changing the rail, only the top part is removed, while the foot remains, the latter not having been exposed to wear and joined to the sills more securely than the usual kind

Experts claim that the new rail will be considerably cheaper in use, easier to change, and that it will eliminate the "wandering" or displacement of the rails while reducing the wear on the olling stock.
