DISCUSSION OF ALASKAILLS

Vancouver Province Warns Canada Not to Follow Example

(Vancouver Province)

It would appear from recent reports that the bright expectations with which some Americans entertained themselves when they purchased Alaska for a song, sixty years ago, have not been fulfilled. The question is now being asked how it comes about that in ours, a commodity in which Alaska might be supposed to excel, the total export from that territory in 1927 was less than one-fifth of the amount produced by the State of Louisiana in the same year, and that the little State of Iowa is able to produce, in the value of its farm products alone, more in a single year than the total output of Alaska from all sources from the date of its purchase to the present time. The Federal Government has spent a good deal of money on the territory. For example, a bill was passed in 1914 for the building of a railway. They have spent seventy millions upon it. About half the road has been built at twice as much cost as was contemplated in the original bill. The road was intended not only for general development but particularly to supply coal for the United States navy. An open port was to be established at Anchorage, far up Cook Inlet, and an attractive townsite was laid out, promising ground for a future city.

The results have been disappointing. Mines have not opened up as expected. The harbour selected was ill-chosen and is now virtually abandoned. The road does not pay. It costs the government four millions a year to maintain and operate it. The population of the territory has dwindled and is still dwindling. There are only 30,000 whites out of a total population of 60,000.
