

Became Violently III From Eating Dog Flesh and Went to Get

The diary was a small copybook, kept by Lanners from October 1, 1926, when he left Fort Resolution for his trap lines on the edge of the Barren lands. LETTERS FROM EDMONTON

In a wallet in the pocket of the dead man were found two letters from other signed "Bob," and an old Alberta return addresses. Inside the little tent the sleeping robe of the dead man, stretched over a caribou skin, lay in one corner, and at its foot was a tin plate with a half gnawed dog leg bone on it, a cup. and a tea-kettle. A small stove had been set up near the door, and beside the bed stood a bag of old clothes, a bag of 303 Savage shells, and about 8 packages of 30.30 ammunition. A small first aid medical kit was also in

Indications were that Lanners had been fairly successful in trapping small furbearers, but no cache was found. existed it had been raided by wolverines with which that section is over-run There was nothing in the camp or on the person of the deceased to indicate where any relatives lived, but it is known he came from Oklahoma, and had applied for naturalization papers.

HAD STARVED BEFORE

Lanners was known as a particularly aring trapper who frequently went into the Barren lands without supplies, depending upon his rifle for food for rotten meat, which was certainly true, himself and dogs. On his own telling he had been caught once before and had to live on his dogs. The trapper was last seen alive on January 2, 1927, by two trappers named Peterson. At that time he had only 30 pounds of flour and a little cornmeal and tallow for dog feed, and was depending on the caribou to see him through. The caribou were late in coming last winter Lanners was, from his diary entries. apparently unable to get sufficient carishot dog after dog, and finally, with the remains of the last animal almost gone, died from weakness and starvation as he had tried to crawl to the waterhole for fish or water.
