

## McLarnin's Career As Star Walloper Ended Dramatically Detroit

Sailed to Answer the Bell After Being Battered and When the matador endeavored to a.m. Bruised for Five Rounds by Ray Miller of Chicago

DETROIT, Dec. 1.—The knockout reign of Jimmy McLarnin, the baby-faced walloper from Vancouver, B. C., ended dramatically here last night, when Ray Miller of Chicago technically knocked him out in the seventh round of a scheduled 10-round bout.

McLarnin, foremost challenger for the world's light weight title, bloody and groggy, was battered savagely for five rounds and then failed to answer the bell when it clanged for the start of the eighth round. He sat in his corner while his seconds tossed the towel into the ring as a token of defeat.
