The holdup occurred in the beer section of the store. Forcing their way through the customers, one man covered W. Montgomery, the vendor, a second pushed the crowd back, while a third remained at the

PACIFICFROM PEACE RIVER

Application to Be Made For Charter for Railway Cutoff to Parkgate

EDMONTON, Dec. 1 .- A special dispatch to the Journal from Winnipeg says:

From Farkgate on the main line of the National a new railway is being planned to give the Peace River district access to the Pacific. Senator Rufus Pope is directing the movement, according to information in local transportation circles. This follows the announcement that the C. N. R. has joined the C. P. R. in acquiring the northern Alberta lines. But it is not disclosed that joint ownership of the proposed cut-off

will necessarily follow. The line would be 150 miles to Grande Prairie. Such a railway, Pope says, would touch the famous Hoppe or Smoky River coal fields now in the possession of the Dominion government at a distance of 77 miles from the main line of the National railways. At Grande Prairie the proposed railway line would reach the gateway of the Peace River district. Senator Pope stated that the route of the proposed railway has been surveyed under the direction of Chief

Canadian National Will Earn Over \$60,000,000 During Current Year

Sir Henry Thornton Urges Vigorous but Sane Immigration Policy for Country and Avoidance of Exploitation

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—The net earnings of the C. N. R. for the year will exceed \$60,000,000, as compared with \$3,-000,000 in 1922, Sir Henry Thornton announced here yesterday, in an address before the Rotary Club. He was firmly convinced, he said, that the profits of the Canadian National Railway were criterions of the nation's advance.

Sir Henry said that the Dominion's immigration policy should be vigorous, but sane, and that new arrivals should be made to feel at home. Above all, they should see national resources developed by, and for, the people, and avoid exploitation.
