PROGRESS MADE BULKLEY MINES

INTEREST IN DISTRICT INDICATED BY NUMBER OF DEALS ARRANGED THIS YEAR

MANY ARE FINANCED
RICH DISTRICT INTERESTS CAPITAL FROM ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTRY

SMITHERS, April 9.—The progress of mining in the Omineca division and particularly in the Bulkley Valley and surrounding mountains is well indicated by the mining deals put through this year and the financing of operations which close to thirty properties are assured of active development. The following is the list as compiled by the Omineca branch of the B.C. Chamber of Mines:

Silver Cup Mine, New Hazelton, taken under option by Duke Mining Co. Ltd. and put up on shipping basis, now starting on concentrator. Option price is \$40,000.
