### A. W. EDGE WAS OLD TIMER

Highly Respected Local Citizen Died Today

A. W. Edge, pioneer businessman and prominent early citizen of Prince Rupert, passed away in the Prince Rupert General Hospital following a lengthy illness from which it had been realized lately that he had no possible chance of recovery. The late Mr. Edge came to Prince Rupert in the early days and engaged in the paint business. He was air ex-alderman and always took deep interest in public affairs. He was widely known and his death will come as a great shock to many friends. He was a prominent member of the Masonic order under the auspices of which his funeral will take place, arrangements being in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers.

A native of England, the late Mr. Edge came to Canada as a young man and pioneered it throughout the west.

A consideration of \$40,000 is understood to have been involved in the transaction. The Big Bay Lumber Co. has not yet decided whether it will continue to operate the plant separately or scrap it for the purpose of otherwise using the site.
