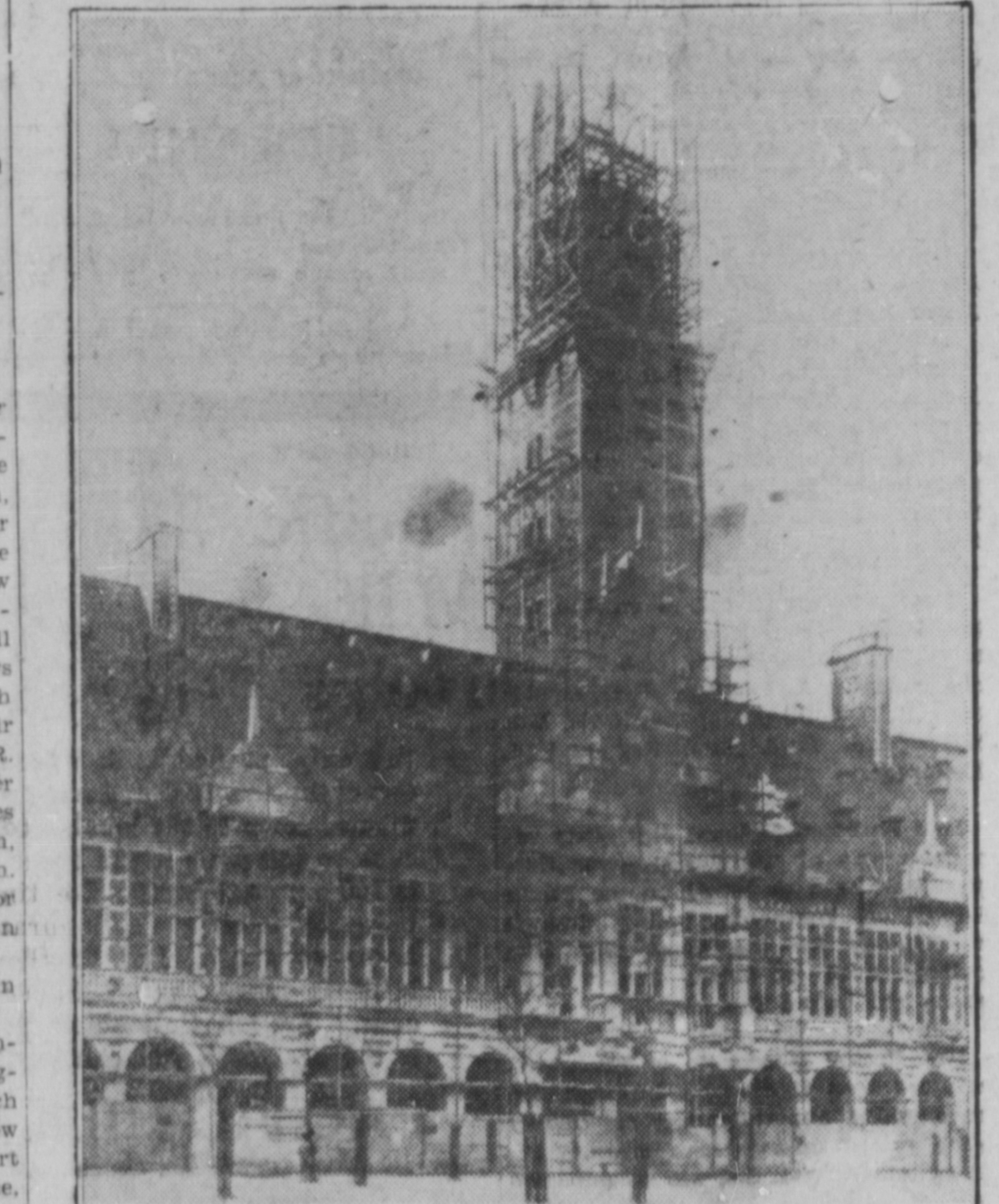
WILLINGDONS CLIMB MOUNT

TOOK THE DAY OFF FROM GOLF—GOVERNOR WILL OPEN CHURCH SUNDAY

JASPER, July 25—Forsaking golf for the day, their Excellencies the Governor-General and Lady Willingdon made the ascent, Friday, of Signal Mountain, behind Jasper Park Lodge. The weather was without a blemish and, from the summit, they had a magnificent view of the surrounding country. Snow covered mountain ranges pushed up all around them and the broad valleys were lined with rivers and jewelled with lakes of surpassing brilliance. With their Excellencies rode Viscount Bardige; R. H. Knight, superintendent of Jasper Park, and his two daughters, James Thomson, son of Sir Henry Thomson, and R. Landford, supervising warden. The outing took a day with a stop for picnic lunch at the cabin near the summit.

Saturday their Excellencies were again on the golf links.

Sunday morning the Governor-General attended service at St. Mary's Anglican church in the town after which he laid the corner stone of the new building. In the afternoon he took part in the Edith Cavell Memorial Service, which was conducted at the front of the Glacier on the mountain peak which was named after the woman, whose death made her heroic in English history.

J. W. H. T. Douglas the Essex cricket captain is nothing if not "game" and recently against Northampton he batted an hour for eight runs. Pasty Hendren the M.C.C. cricketer still heads the batting averages in English cricket with an average of 94.75 runs, and is within a few runs of reaching an aggregate of 2,000 for the season. Freeman is well ahead among the bowlers having taken over 100 wickets at a cost of 16 runs each. In local circles some surprise has been expressed that while Association football may be called the national game of the masses in England yet they were not represented at the Olympic games. Nations that are members of the Federation of International Football Associations allow their players to receive payment for loss of time while playing football.
