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BUDGET ANNOUNCES TAX REDUCTION

Cut in Taxes and Advance Policy Announced First Budget MacLean Government in the Legislature

Over half million less for people of Province to Absentee vote abolished; P.G.E. action delayed until later in session; Development, settlement and publicity planned

VICTORIA, February 11.—Taxes will be cut by \$550,000 spread over virtually all classes of taxpayers, Premier MacLean announced in his budget speech yesterday afternoon.

All income taxes will be cut ten per cent.

A discount of ten per cent will be allowed on the turnover tax for payment before the date of delinquency.

The minimum payment under the turnover tax will be reduced from three dollars to one to assist rural business establishments.

The present turnover tax of one half of one per cent on the first four thousand dollars of income earned by professional men, agents or brokers will be reduced to one quarter of one per cent—a reduction of fifty per cent.

To assist coal mining the present tax of four per cent per acre on class B lands containing coal but not thoroughly developed will be reduced to two per cent or one half of the present rate.

The whole basis of the unearned increment tax on profit made from sales of natural resources will be changed. Instead of taxing these profits, it is proposed to adjust the depletion allowances in the taxing of natural resources. The depletion allowances will be based on amounts actually expended upon properties involved in sales.

All payments out of superannuation funds will be exempted entirely from income tax.

Further allowances will be made for contributions to employees' superannuation funds.

Expenditures for the coming year are estimated to total \$20,821,360 with revenue of \$20,830,296, leaving an estimated surplus of \$8,935.

The estimated expenditures include provision for statutory salary increases for all civil servants and other salary adjustments in the civil service and expenditure of \$400,000 in old age pensions during the next fiscal year. Other major increases total \$945,000.

The budget also provides for a loan bill of \$4,600,000 for highways, bridges, public buildings and university lands development.

DESERTERS FROM SHIPS DEPORTED

Six Men Embarked Today Aboard
Grain Ship Sagoland—Deserted
From Her and Syland

Six deserters from the Swedish grain ship Syland and Sagoland, who have been picked up recently by the police, are being kept back aboard the Sagoland today for deportation at the order of Dr. H. E. Tremayne, local immigration officer. Attempts to enter the country by stealth are frequent on the part of foreign merchant vessels. It is, however, an illegal practice which the authorities are thus dealing with.

Resolution Passed Unanimously Regard to Alaskan Panhandle by Legislature of British Columbia

Conservative, Fearful of Trap, Urges Care but do not Oppose Move
While Both Pattullo and Manson Strongly Favor it

VICTORIA, February 11.—The resolution of H. F. Kergin, member for Atlin, urging action by the Dominion government to open negotiations with Washington for acquisition of the Panhandle of Alaska passed without a division of the Legislature.

H. D. Twigg, Conservative, expressed the opinion that there was something behind the move and suggested the inspiration came from Ottawa. He wanted to know whether the government was aware of any negotiations between Ottawa and Washington in the matter and whether there was a move toward making it figure in the St. Lawrence waterways negotiations.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo said some persons thought the efforts to secure the Alaska panhandle would prove abortive but he did not agree with them.

R. H. Pooley, leader of the opposition, sounded a note of warning and reminded the House that the United States had a record for driving a hard bargain with Canada and suggested extreme care in the negotiations to make sure the Dominion did not pay too dearly for the panhandle.

Hon. A. M. Manson said this was not the time to discuss the details of the plan but said he did not believe a country like the United States which had been taking the lead in advocating self-determination for the world would stand in the way of doing justice. "I cannot think that in such a small matter, for it is a small matter to the United States although not to us, she would take a different position from that set for herself in the last ten years."

Reminding the House of recent statements made by President Beatty of the C.P.R. that the next decade

would be an era of expansion and great railway building, Mr. Manson predicted that important roads not now anticipated eventually would be built into the north. It might take a year to consummate British Columbian's dream in regard to the panhandle but nothing could be consummated unless a beginning were made. "I think some of us here will live to see the day," he said.

SAGOLAND TO SAIL TODAY

Swedish Freighter off With Large
Cargo of Wheat for Rotterdam
—Mabriton and Ashby on
Berth

With one of the largest cargoes of
grain ever loaded at Prince Rupert, the
Swedish freighter Sagoland will depart
today from the Alberta Wheat Pool's
Prince Rupert elevator for Rotterdam,
Holland. The Sagoland has been in
port for something like ten days, hav-
ing had to be lined.

Leading of the British freighter Ma-
briton is now proceeding and this ves-
sel should get away early next week.

The British steamer Ashby, sixteenth
grain ship of the season here, which
arrived in port Thursday night, will
move up to the elevator on the de-
parture of the Sagoland.

Railway offices this morning reported
nearly six hundred cars of grain on
the way from the prairies bound for
Prince Rupert. There were three hundred
cars ads on the Edmonton and
Calgary divisions east of Jasper Park
and nearly that number west of Jas-
per. Twenty-one cars arrived here dur-
ing the past twenty-four hours.
