Influenza Epidemic is Sweeping Basin of Mackenzie River Where Indians Dying in Large Numbers

EDMONTON, Aug. 17.-Scourging the Indian population along the asbanks of the Mackenzie River the influenza epidemic which has been raging in the north for some time has taken toll of 275 natives within a period of about two weeks, according to reports received. So far as know nno white man has succumbed to the disease. A total of 53 is known to have succumbed at Fort Simpson alone. The full toll of deaths may not be known for months.

One point along the river hit by the epidemic is Fort Resolution where fifty are dead, Fork McRae 33; Fort Norman 28; Fort Good Hope 26; Fort McPherson 21; and Forth ----
