Unexploited Hunting Ground Abounds With Many Big Fish

FORT ST. JAMES, B.C. (CP)—In the past the hunter or fisherman who made his way to this north-central British Columbia village in search of game has been one of two kinds.

He was either a well-heeled American, able to charter an airplane, or a British Columbian keen enough to disregard a long drive over washboard roads.

This year the wealthy Americans didn't show up. They were discouraged by their government's embargo on livestock imports from Canada which included game meat and trophies.

MATTER OF TIME

But it's only a matter of time, residents say, before word-of-mouth within the province coupled with completion of a new road-building program, will popularize the district.

Fort St. James is the gateway to an as yet unexploited area where some of the finest hunting and fishing in the province

are to be found. In Stuart Lake there are fighting rainbow trout running up to 25 pounds and char, or lake trout, as big as 40 pounds.

This lake is 50 miles long and seven miles across at its widest point. The big rainbows are found lurking in the narrow, mountain-rimmed western end.

As is usual when big fish are at stake, everyone around here has his own idea on the lure "that can't miss." Most popular this season were bright flatfish, although a variety of spoons and fancier doo-dads still bring in their share of the catch.

If all the accepted lures fail to produce, a baited hook can be used on about three inches of leader behind a flasher.

GOOD FOR TROLLING

Top-notch trolling is also found on Trembleur lake, 15 miles up the navigable Tachie river from Stuart lake. Guides tell you that rainbow in Trembleur, though smaller on the average than in Stuart, are a superior fish. Colder water makes them firmer and gives them more fight.
