PRESBYTERIAN ANNIVERSARY

New Church Has Now Been Open
for Three Years — Work of
Congregation Since Early
Days Reviewed

The third anniversary of the opening of the present edifice of First Presbyterian Church was observed with special services yesterday. There were large congregations both morning and evening.

In his sermon at the morning service, Rev. J. R. Frizell discussed the value of the church to the community and gave a review of the work of First Presbyterian Church in Prince Rupert from the year 1908 when Donald McLeod and Fred Garton were its first elders down to the present day. He referred to the various pastors who had charge including Rev. W. J. Kidd, Rev. J. Ross, Rev. F. W. Kerr, Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant, Rev. Dr. Charles J. Cameron, etc. Two numbers were sung by the Junior Choir and a feature of the service was the solo "God Loves His Little Children" by little Miss Dorothy Fraser who was in good voice.

In the evening, Mr. Frizell gave a discourse on Spiritualism with special reference to the beliefs along this line of Sir Oliver Lodge and Arthur Conan Doyle. There was an anthem by the choir "Oh! For a Closer Walk with God," solo parts being taken by Miss E. Davies, J. A. Teng and A. Clapperton.

The pulpit of the church was draped out of respect to the late Rev. Dr. Leslie Clay, moderator of the General Assembly of Canada, whose death occurred last week.

BASKETBALL AT PORT SIMPSON

Kincolith Cagers Lost Two Games
at End of Week—Beaten by
Y.P.E.A. and P.S.A.C.

PORT SIMPSON, Feb. 6.—Kincolith lost two basketball games to Port Simpson in a series here at the end of the week.

In the first game, the score was 27 to 35 in favor of the Y.P.E.A. The game was not very fast as the visitors started to play about half an hour after arriving late in the evening, thus having had no opportunity of practising.

The following day, Kincolith played the Port Simpson Athletic Club, holders of the Northern British Columbia championship title. The P.S.A.C., which led 11-9 at the end of the first half, finished victorious with a score of 30-10. This game was faster than the one the evening previous.

Good-sized crowds watched both matches.

The second game was followed by a dance for which music was furnished by Charles Pierce and his orchestra.

THEATRE WILL BE DISCUSSED

Council to Deal at Meeting To-
night With Vexed Question
of Lane Space for Mizak
Aivazoff

The vexed question of granting the request of Misak Aivazoff for twenty-five feet of lane space to the rear of the site on Third Avenue upon which he contemplates the erection of a theatre building will be dealt with at tonight's regular meeting of the city council. Opinion is understood to be considerably divided upon the matter and an acrimonious debate is looked for by some.

Another matter which the council will have to deal with on this occasion will be the indemnity bylaw, providing for the salaries of mayor and aldermen during the coming year.

LIGHT COLOR PAINT SAVES MUCH MONEY

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Feb. 6.—By painting gas tanks with a light color paint, a saving of 100,000,000 gallons of gasoline annually is made by refining companies of the United States, Dr. Henry A. Gardner, Washington, D.C., told the annual convention of the Master Painters and Decorators Association of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Gardner said the light color of the tanks reduced the temperature from 150 to 116 degrees, which accounted for the saving. He added that radiators painted dark prevented a proper radiation of heat and asserted that a saving of 15 to 18 degrees could be made by the use of light color paint.

GOLF IS NECESSARY FOR NAVAL OFFICERS

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Feb. 6.—United States naval officers must be golfers. Ability in the sport is now a requirement for a commission. The explanation is that the navy develops men, not wallflowers, and officers should know their golf for social reasons because they will associate with men who play the game.

UNION STEAMSHIPS TO CHANGE BOATS

Venture to Come on Run of Cardena
This Week and Latter Vessel will
Relieve Camosun

The Union Steamship Co. announces that the steamer Venture will come on the Vancouver-Bella Coola-Ocean Falls-Skeena River-Prince Rupert run this week, arriving here from the south Friday night, in place of the Cardena until further orders.

Another change will also be made this week by which the Cardena will relieve the Camosun on the Vancouver-Prince Rupert-Anxox-Stewart run for one week, arriving here from the south next Sunday afternoon. The Camosun in the meantime will receive annual inspection and overhaul at Vancouver and the Cardena will go off the following week for annual overhaul.

The Camosun, it is understood, will remain on the Sunday run, with the exception of the one week, until the return to service of the steamer Catala.

SILVER PRODUCTION IN UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Feb. 6.—The United States produced 4,748,000 fine ounces of silver in December against 5,010,000 in November, bringing total output for 1925 to 59,145,000 ounces against 60,918,000 in 1924. Canada's production for the year was 20,918,000 ounces against 21,255,000 in 1924. Peru produced 18,396,000 ounces in 1925, against 21,100,000 the year before and Australia, 9,275,000 ounces against 8,557,000 in 1924.
