SPORT CHAT

From the looks of the line-ups, the old complaint that the Maple Leafs have corralled all the players and nobody else has a chance should be heard no more. Not more than two of the former Maple Leafs regular stars were put on in the first game last night. On the other hand, the Drill Team has a bright array of strength and some new players as well. With the line-ups such as they are, there should be many a tight game during the winter between these two groups of young ladies. Quality and closeness of play in all the opening games last night augurs well for the success and interest which should follow basketball activities in Prince Rupert this winter.

Big sloop racing is to be renewed on the Atlantic next summer, with the former America's Cup yachts Resolute and Vanitie returned to their single-mast rig. E. Walter Clark of Philadelphia, owner of Resolute, became convinced last summer after she continued to trail Vanitie in schooner dress that the old cup defender was not rigged at her best, and he decided to change her back to a sloop. His decision left no close competitor in sight for Vanitie, and H. P. Whitney, the latter's owner, about decided to keep his racer on the beach another summer. Now Mr. Whitney has decided to follow suit to Mr. Clark, and return Vanitie to the sloop class. The change will be particularly interesting, as the Cup yachts Resolute and Vanitie masts with the jib-headed main sails that have become the vogue since the last America's Cup year 1920, when they had gaff mainsails and club topsails. In addition, as sloops, the two will have as competitors several other big racing craft.

The suggestion that member bodies of the Canadian Boxing Federation affiliate with the New York State Boxing Commission will not meet with unanimous approval, comments the Toronto Globe. The National Boxing Association, in recent annual convocation, showed how politics can be played in boxing, and the Canadians served notice of their withdrawal from the N. B. A. The proposal to "sit in" with the New York and affiliated organizations seems like deserting the frying-pan to jump into the fire. For several years the New York outfit has set itself on a pedestal of its own building, and looked down in contemptuous hauteur on all and sundry, ignoring constituted authority everywhere. If the proposed merger is an effort to "show" the N.B.A. the move is both ill-timed and unnecessary. "Foreign entanglements" to borrow the phraseology of an eminent U.S. statesman, are apt to be unsatisfactory as was the brief alliance with the National Boxing Association. They should be entered into with extreme care and adequate reservations.
