

DISSOLUTION OF FOUNDATION

Petition to Government States Continuation not in Interests of Decency

VANCOUVER, Oct. 30.—Application was made today by way of a petition to the Lieut. Governor in Council for the dissolution of the Acquarian Foundation at Cedar, near Nanaimo. The petitioners Maurice von Platen, Rob-De Luce and E. A. Lucas, governors of the society, state "that it is not in the interests of decency that the society should continue to exist."

Mr. Lucas states that the establishment by Wilson of another settlement known as the Mandieth settlement and the promulgation of his views on marriage have been responsible for the trouble.

CANADIAN GETS HIGHEST PRICE

Total of 284,500 Pounds of Halibut Sold Today, Most of it Being American

The lone Canadian boat offering its catch at the local Fish Exchange this morning received 14c and 7c, a better price than was paid twelve American vessels which were in. The day's sales totalled 284,500 pounds, all but 9,000 pounds being American halibut.

CHAS. EDGAR IS DROWNED

Member of Well Known District Family Lost His Life at Alert Bay at First of Week

Charles Edgar, well known in this district where he was born 25 years ago, lost his life at the first of this week by drowning from a fish boat on which he was working out of Alert Bay. William Edgar, member of the staff of the Prince Rupert Salvage & Towing Co., a brother, was notified that the body had been recovered and sailed yesterday afternoon on the Catala for Victoria where the funeral will be held.

Deceased lived in Prince Rupert for several years, having been "planted" with fishing boats. He was married and is survived besides his widow, at present in Endako, by a young child. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Edgar, formerly of Vanarsdol and now residing in Victoria. There are two brothers—William of this city and Dick, who is on the coast—and two sisters—Mrs. Dan Lidstone and Mrs. Kilbreath of Victoria. The whole family is well known here, having formerly been resident in the city.

ZERO TODAY AT DAWSON

MORE ORE AT DUNWELL MINE

Radiore or Electrical Prospecting Campaign Shows up Further Possibilities on Property

F. F. Clarge, supervisor for the Radiore Company, and R. C. Kirkpatrick, who has been actually in charge of the work, together with their party, were passengers aboard the Catala yesterday proceeding to Vancouver after having spent the past few weeks conducting an electrical prospecting campaign on the Dunwell mine at Stewart. Robert M. Stewart, head of the Dunwell, is also a passenger on the same vessel going through to Victoria.

Mr. Stewart is highly pleased with the results that have been obtained by the Radiore examination. Ore bodies to the south and north are indicated as well as to the south and east of the old Dunwell workings. To co-relate these results with the known geological conditions, a diamond drilling campaign will be inaugurated next spring.

Sometimes it extends an invitation to visit some good friends and sometimes informs us of a visit from cousin Tom just at the busiest time of year when visitors are a nuisance.

Since the mail plays such a vital part in our lives, I think that every means possible to expediate its delivery promptly and immediately to our homes would make life a little more pleasant and place Prince Rupert a notch nearer to the desired position of a city.

nection with the wages of a man named Field employed as kitchen assistant, whom the company claimed did not come under the Act as he was in reality a domestic servant. He was employed at Campbell River.

The trial judge found in favor of the company. The court of appeal in British Columbia reversed the finding and the supreme court now endorses the decision of the trial judge.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 30.—The logging industry in British Columbia is relieved of a liability estimated at \$300,000 by the decision of the supreme court of Canada which in effect finds that "flunkies" in logging camps do not come within the provisions of the Minimum Wage Act.

New Legislation

It is possible that new legislation may be introduced in the provincial Legislature immediately to cover what appears to be a flaw in the Male Minimum Wage Act of B. C., J. D. McNiven, deputy minister of labor, stated in regard to the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada that the act is ultra vires and invalid. "It seems likely that the new Legislature will be required to remedy the situation but until we get something more definite as to the precise meaning of the court findings I cannot make a statement."
