Waterfront Whiffs

Trolling Operations Having But Fair Success—Minor Accidents to Halibut Fleet—Landings up Again Here

Uncertain and fluctuating results have featured the trolling season on the various grounds contiguous to Prince Rupert of late. Here and there have been fairly good runs of salmon, though usually of brief duration, to be punctuated with longer periods when the fish have been scarce and fishing has been carried on with rather unsatisfactory results. A few of the trollers, no doubt, have struck it lucky and been able to make good but, generally speaking, up to the middle of July, this line of fishing has been featured by no spectacular measure of success, to say the best of it.

Last week a good run developed for three or four days in the vicinity of Zayna Island and Stephens and Dundas Island trollers reaped a brief harvest, catching as high as 175 cohoes in a day's fishing. A falling off, to thirty fish soon followed, however, and this week southeast winds had to a large extent tied up the boats in this vicinity. Latest reports showed about seventy boats at Dundas Island engaged in trolling and some forty at Stephens.

Trolling in Warke Canal so far this season has been below the usual standard and that area is now reported to be practically deserted by gasboats with fishing being largely confined to hand from rowboats.

At North Island a considerable improvement in trolling for sprats and cohoes has been reported recently. The run at Hippo Island, however, is reported to have been virtually a failure and all the boats have moved from there to North Island.

Oller Besner's cruiser Rosina B. was on the Lipsitt Ways on Thursday to have her tailshaft drawn in order that new couplings might be fitted by the Star Welding.

REPAIRS TO CLUTCH

The clutch of the trolling boat Kayex, Capt. John Anderson, was brought over from the Islands by a fish packer this week for repairs.

Y. Suehiro, Cow Bay boat builder, is now engaged in the building of a 36' open pleasure boat for Louis Amadio of the Ward Electric & Marine Supply Co. A 4 h.p. Callie-Perfection two cycle gas engine will be installed in the boat which will soon be finished.

The Suga yard is engaged in the building of an 18 foot open boat for Dr. Ned Tait. An outboard motor will be used as motive power.

On the Ward Ways recently have been the Royal III, Capt. Ole Olsen, which is changing from halibut to salmon trolling gear; the halibut boats Verna, Capt. Pete Thompson, and Atli, Capt. William Bussey, both undergoing summer painting, and the gill netter Lily II.

The well known local halibut boat M. M. Christopher, owned jointly by the skipper, Capt. Alf Jacobson, and Dr. W. T. Kergin, is at present in Vancouver for installation of a 48 h.p. Gardner diesel engine, sold through the Ward Electric & Marine Supply Co., local agents. The performance of the new motor will be watched with considerable interest for it is the first Gardner engine to be installed in the local halibut fleet.

During the past season, the agents sport, Gardiners, have been greatly in demand in Vancouver for all styles of coats and they are said to have proven most satisfactory. It is, even asserted that two of these engines have been sold for every one of other makes lately.

The M. M. Christopher is expected to return to Prince Rupert about the end of this month. —Advt.

Thor Johnson has had his boat on the Yacht Club grid this week for straightening out of the shaft and other underwater work.


A scowload of coal and scowload of lumber is due from Vancouver for Albert & McCaffery.
