UNITED STATES POLICY

The policy of President Coolidge in urging the building of more big cruisers should not be interpreted as being a dare to Great Britain. There has been no such intimation given. The United States has to defend its western as well as its eastern coast and the latest deevlopments in China will make it even more important that a police navy be maintained which will make it possible to keep order among Oriental peoples.

Also it may be mentioned that as the United States has assumed a benevolent protectorate over all other American countries, practically pledging itself to defend them against aggression, it becomes necessary for that country to have a big navy. The failure of Canada to provide any defence makes it important for the States to provide more.

WARNING OF BANK

The head of the Bank of Montreal has issued a warning to the people of Canada against the speculation which is going on and which is likely to lead to disaster. It is particularly at New York that the craze is now evident, but its ramifications extend to almost every part of Canada. Stock exchange gambling is much too prevalent for the good of the nation. Should a crisis be precipitated it would tend to paralyze legitimate business.
