Champion Gene Tunney Pounds Decisive Victory Out of Tom Heeney in World's Title Bout

NEW YORK, July 27.—Leading on a wide margin of points in ten rounds, Gene Tunney, world heavyweight boxing champion, retained his title here last night by means of a technical knockout in the eleventh round over the New Zealand challenger, Tom Heeney. The referee, Eddie Forbes called "the battle of the century" to a close as the reeling Anzac, bloody and staggering, was out on his feet. It was an excellent battle in which the ex-marine clearly showed his boxing superiority, justifying the opinion that he is one of the greatest champions in the history of the ring. Heeney was a game though outclassed opponent.

Something in the neighborhood of 70,000 persons witnessed the bout which took place in the Stadium and there were many notable individuals present prominent among them the ex-champion, Jack Dempsey.

Eddie Forbes was the referee and the judges were Charles F. Mathelson and Tom King. The latter had no work to do. Joe Humphries, a veteran, was the announcer. Will F. Flynn had charge of the bout which was promoted by Tex Rickard.

The first preliminary lasted only 32 seconds and it took five minutes to revive the loser. The next was scheduled six-rounder, between George Larocco of Fordham and Herman Heller of Germany. Pasty Haley also refereed this bout. Larocco was awarded the decision.

SEMI-FINAL

The principals in the semi-final of six rounds were George Hoffman, formerly heavyweight champion of the state of New York, and Ade Warren of North Carolina. The crowd was anxious for the main event and would not warm up to the semi-finalists. Hoffman and Warren struggled through the second and third rounds and, by that time, Hoffman evidently figured that things in the professional ranks were not as easy as in the amateurs. Warren was giving Hoffman plenty to think about. The crowd was restless and impatient, however, and razed the boys' efforts. They were wanting Tunney and Heeney to go in the ring and have it over with. The decision was awarded to Warren. The crowd was glad it was over and got up for a little stretch before the main event.

Jack Dempsey, sitting immediately behind the press row, was besieged by well wishers who kept the former champion busy for a while shaking hands. Dempsey was evasive in his answers as to whether he would try and regain his lost title. He was sitting by a little girl in yellow. During the preliminaries, Jack jumped over the press seats and spoke a few words over the radio, saying he hoped the best man would win. Dempsey will long remain the idol of Young America. Announcer Humphries pulled Dempsey into the ring at the demand of the crowd.

Knut Hansen, Johnny Risko and Tommy Loughran were introduced to the crowd. Jack Sharkey was also introduced.

Governor Greene of Michigan and Governor Moore of New Jersey were among the late arrivals. Roy Howard, chairman of the board of Scripps-Howard publications, was among the notable guests.

ney was first to land hammering ribs with left. Tunney missed a hard right as Tom swayed sideways. Tunney sent two short right uppercuts to the jaw, as Heeney tried to mix it at close quarters. Tom's nose was bleeding freely. Tunney jabbed a pair of lefts to the face and landed right to ear. Tunney sent various right jabs to jaw and Heeney tried a left swing but missed and he went down. The champion again smashed Heeney at the bell.

Sixth Round—Heeney tried a right to body but was short. Gene sent a light left to face and then drove a hard right to body. Heeney backed the champ to the ropes but could not hurt him. Tom did not seem able to get away from rights to the jaw. Tom rushed Gene to the ropes but Tunney peppered him with both hands. Tom's right was blocked once but he later landed a left to the ear. Tunney ripped two rights to ribs and a left and right to jaw. The crowd roared as Heeney sagged at the knees. It was all Tunney's round.

MEMORABLE HOUR

Seventh Round—This was the round which Dempsey dropped Tunney and the champion smiled faintly as one of the fans asked him if he remembered it. Tunney landed a wicked right under the heart. Tom kept plodding but Tunney landed five punches to Tom's nose. Tunney sent a hard right to the head and to follow up, Tunney backed rapidly out of range of Heeney's wild swings. Tunney hooked a left to body and caught the return on his shoulder at the bell.

Eighth Round—Tunney shook his head and danced all over the challenger. Heeney went to close quarters where Tunney had the better of a light exchange. Tunney sent a stiff one to the face and a hard right to the left eye. Heeney backed around the ring rubbing his eye. His left eye was bothering him and he blinked furiously and did not appear to see clearly. Tunney sparred and put a half dozen lefts to the face, making a target out of Tom's bad eye. Heeney was holding on now and it appeared as if the "hard rock" was softening. Tom staged a rally lashing out furiously but Tunney nearly blinded him with both hands as the bell rang.
