## JOE BROWN AND BERT MORGAN QUALIFY FOR 2ND BILLIARD ROUND

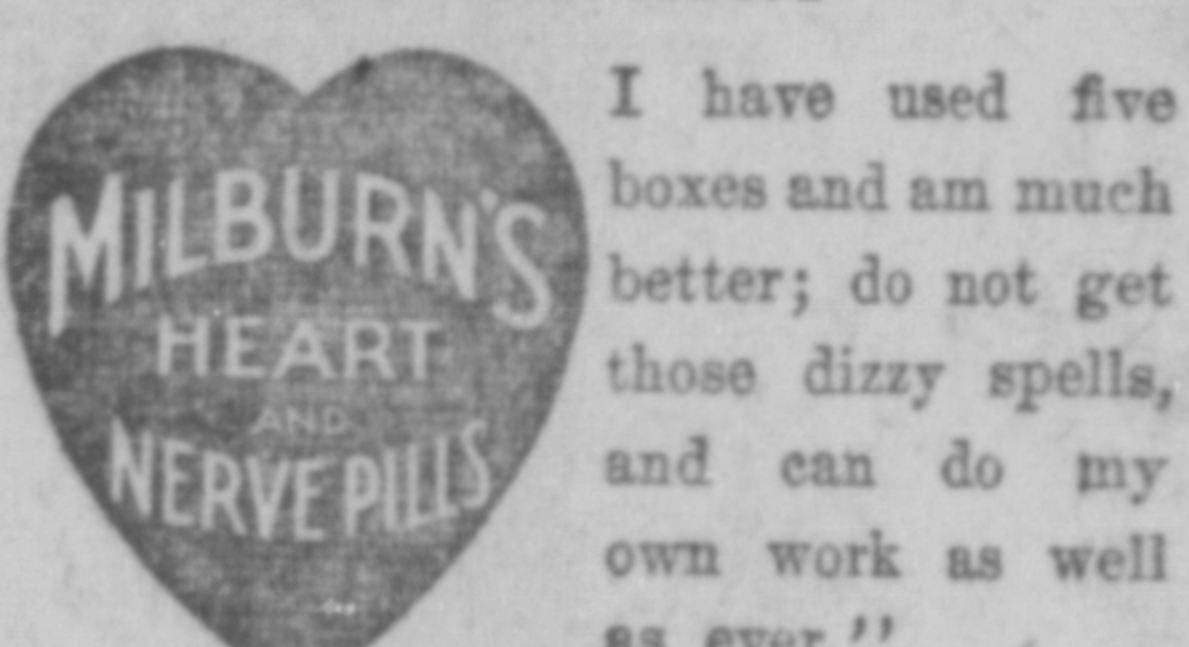
Joe Brown and Bert Morgan are now qualified for the second round of the junior individual city billiard championship series.
