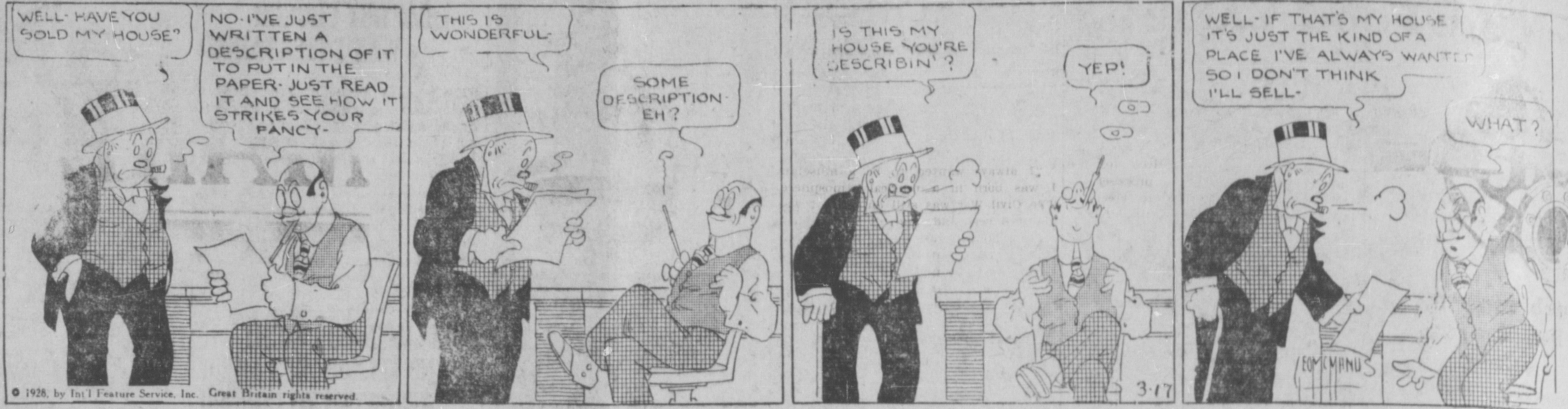

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IRISH CONCERT WAS DIFFERENT

NEW NOTE STRICK IN ST. PATRICK'S DAY ENTERTAINMENT THIS YEAR UNDER NEW MANAGEMENT

QUALITY, NOT QUANTITY  
PLENTY OF GOOD IRISH FUN, MUSIC AND DANCES AT ANNUAL EVENT

The annual St. Patrick's Day concert under the auspices of the Catholic Church arranged by M. J. Dougherty with Bishop Bunoz as patron and J. J. Muldoon as business manager was different from anything that had gone before. Instead of the large number of songs and dances, these were confined to but a few numbers and the remainder of the program being interesting and amusing sketches put on by some of the clever local artists.

Promptly at the appointed time the Westholme Orchestra struck up the melody of Irish airs without any announcement and the concert was on. It also closed at the appointed time giving slightly over two hours of real enjoyment.

The girls' drill team under direction of Douglas Frizzell was just as popular as ever, the pyramid and other gymnastic work being a revelation of picturesqueness and precision. The team was composed of Misses Laura Frizzell, Catherine Irvine, Ada Mengohr, May Thompson, Evelyn Dalby, Edna Unger, Dot Edgar, Julia Walters, Chris McLeod and Evelyn March.

D. B. Finn in "The Kerry Dance" sang well and his work was appreciated. He gave for an encore "Oh the Time is Long, Mavourneen." His accompanist was H. N. Brocklesby.

What was recorded in the program as an Irish Jig by Master Peter Byrne turned out to be a team dance by the little six year old lad and his older sister. Naturally he was a little shy and confused coming before the public at such an early age, but he was, as one of the audience remarked, "just too cute for anything." Both he and his sister Annie Byrne danced nicely and the number proved very entertaining.

The quartette by E. Smith, D. B. Finn, L. Smith and M. H. Blott accompanied by H. N. Brocklesby seems to be a new discovery. They proved very entertaining and were given a good reception. The more they sing together, the better their voices will blend. Their score was "Peaceful Night."

"The Pair of Lunatics," an amusing sketch by Miss Virginia Bell and J. Parquhar, each of whom takes the other for a lunatic, was well executed. At times the audience might have imagined they were lunatics but they were not, as the denouement showed. They entertained very acceptably and were given a good deal of applause.

Miss Mable Jackson in the Irish love song "Would God I Were the Tender Apple Blossom," upheld her previous good reputation as a vocalist. Her stage presence and entrancing gown added to the enjoyment of her singing. Her encore number also went well. Miss Lorna Tite accompanied.

One of the most spectacular and pleasing numbers on the program was the Irish dance by Misses MacLaren, Thomson, Grieve, Palmer, McCaffery and Riel. They kept good time and the dance went with a swing.

The dialogue "Just Nonsense," between Alex. Cannon and J. Dougherty was a side-splitting little sketch with Dougherty as the comedian. It contained some local references and was witty and bright throughout.

Mrs. J. J. Muldoon was better than ever in her song, "Believe Me if all Those Endearing Young Charms," accompanied by Miss Virginia Riel and her encore number "When First I Saw Sweet Peggy" was equally well sung.

The one-act play, "Yes, George," proved to be a winner and the end must have been eminently satisfactory to George. It was the story of a young man who found it difficult to propose to his pretty sweetheart, a very difficult thing to simulate but well acted. The difficulty George found was that his young lady friend Anna (Miss Mollie Jackson) was too popular and her many friends almost entirely obliterated him. The ruse adopted to get rid of the friends while retaining Anna was effective and in the end all turned out well. Louis Smith took the part of the lover to perfection and Anna used all the wiles of a charming girl to lead him on. The obtruding friends who flocked in at an unfortunate moment were Misses Lillian Cross, Winnie Thomson, Jean

Grieve, Dr. J. R. Gosse, Fred Smith, Carl Brand and Arthur Sharpe.
