W. E. COLLISON TELLS PIONEERS SOME INTERESTING HISTORICAL EVENTS AT THEIR BANQUET

Rev. W. E. Collison, speaking at the Ploneers' banquet last night, spoke most interestingly of a few of the historic events of the early days of the district around Prince Rupert. He said that he was a native son, having been born only a few miles away. He was acquainted with the site of Prince Rupert long before the city had been founded. of historic interest. Mr. Collison also paid his respects to the hardy band of missionaries who had made the country safe for settle-


The Hudson Bay Company had had to maintain law and order and in order to do so it was necessary to build walled forts, indicating that the natives were a fierce and freacherous people. Port Simpson was established in 1934 and trading posts were located at Massett, Skeena Forks (now Hazelton) and other

Speaking of conditions in the early days, Mr. Collison said Port Simpson was the centre of trade on the coast and Port Essington was also important. The old steamer Otter called every two or three months trading with the natives as she made the trip. Other communication was in dugout canoes.

The first cannery was built on the Skeena by Colonel Lane at Inverness. Various interesting anecdotes of early life embellished the address which was listened to with great interest, the speaker concluding by asserting that the pioneer was never a pessimist. When the progress of this district in so short a time was noted there was every reason for being an optimist.
