Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age. and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occapation, .nd improvement for agricultural

Full information concerning reguations regarding pre-emptions in given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of the

Applications for pre-emptions are missioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed tained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be
