TORONTO, Nov. 30.—New York Rangers opened up a gap in the American group of the National Hockey League but the Canadian group is jumbled.

The Rangers outlucked Chicago in an overtime duel at New York last night, Detroit earning a one-all tie with Montreal at Detroit tied with Boston for the runner up position.

Pittsburgh again tied the Canadiens at Montreal with the result that only two points now separate the leading three teams, the N. Y. Americans, Toronto and the Canadiens.

The purchasing company will manufacture tweeds, blankets and woollen flannels using only British Columbia wool. This is the first company to thus utilize the local wools.
