HUNTING FATALITY

Yesterday the whole city was stirred by the report brought from Hartley Bay that two prominent Prince Rupert citizens had been lost there while out hunting. They were well known men and prominent in affairs. Mr. Gibbons, especially, was one of the leaders in all movements for the betterment of the city. He had been president of the Board of Trade and had given the city excellent service in that position and his name was usually included in those comprising important committees having public work to perform. Such services were given freely and his advice was often sought.

While it is not absolutely sure that Mr. Gibbons and Mr. Johnson were drowned, little hope is extended that they will again be seen alive. Mr. Gibbons' dog always stuck close to him and he would hardly have deserted him on this occasion. If they are gone, as it is feared they are, the loss is to be greatly deplored.

VICTORIA ELECTION

The Edmonton Bulletin, dealing with the by-election in Victoria, says:
 "It is quite out of the ordinary for so much heavy political artillery to be employed in a by-election. So much out of the ordinary as to indicate that there is more at stake than the decision as to whether Victoria is to be represented by a private member on one side of the house or on the other. The unusual support that is being given him by the government, and the unusual effort that is being made to defeat him by the opposition, suggest that the leaders on both sides recognize Dr. MacLean to be a promising recruit for a place in the cabinet at Ottawa if the electors of Victoria should give him a chance to qualify by electing him to parliament."

THIRD GRAIN SHIP LEAVES

SS Carperby Sailed Yesterday For Hampton Roads, Virginia, For Orders

The British steamer Carperby, third grain ship of the season at this port, sailed at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon for Hampton Roads, Virginia, where she will receive orders for the delivery of her full wheat cargo to the United Kingdom and Continent.

Up to this morning, elevator offices had not been definitely advised as to further grain ships coming here although at least one is expected very soon.

There are over five hundred cars of grain today on the railway division west of Jasper Park bound for Prince Rupert. Deliveries have been rather slow during the past few days, following Sunday's train derailment near Kwinitsa.

Following their marriage which will take place in the latter part of December, it is expected that Mr. Gilbert and his bride will reside in Vancouver.



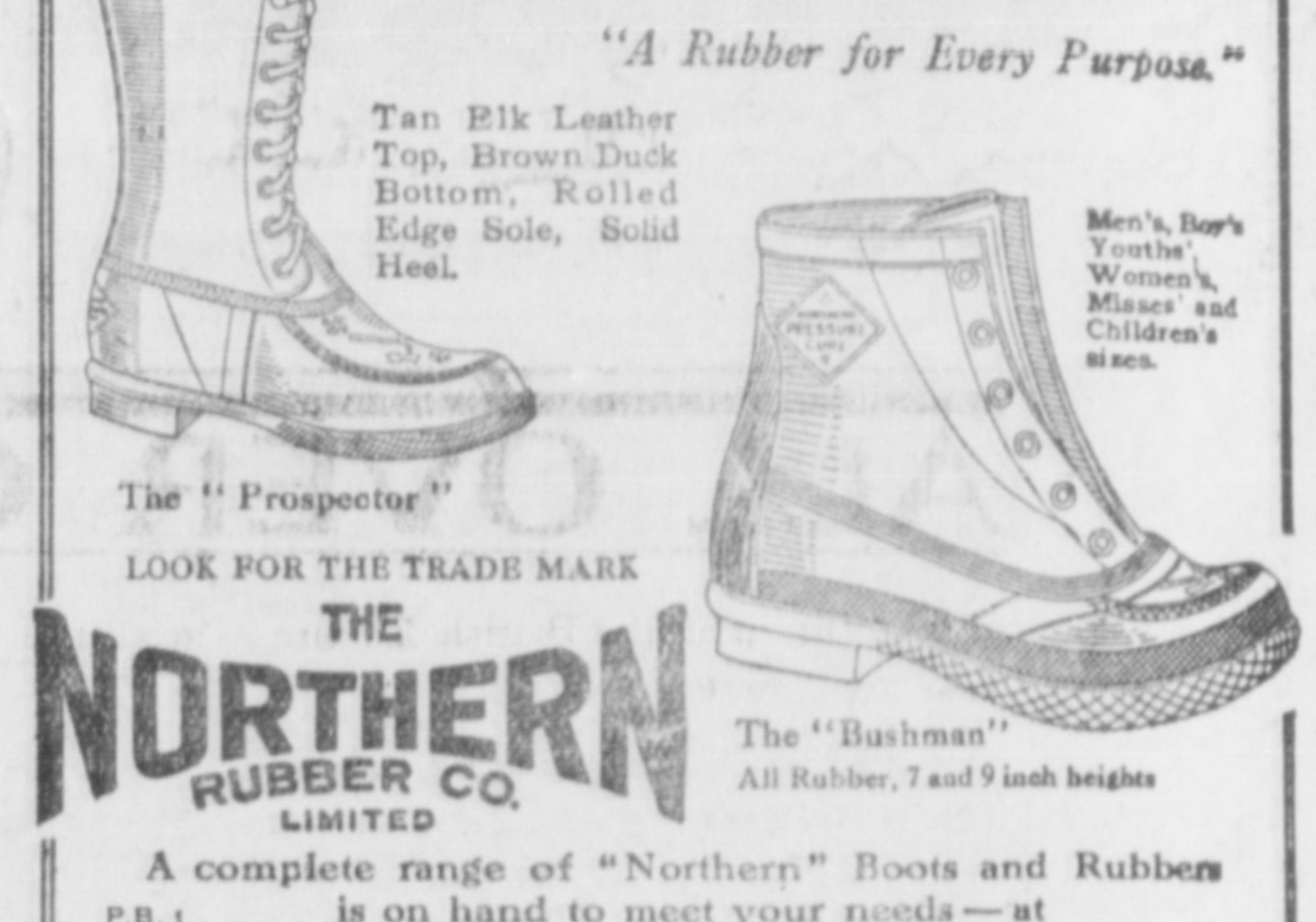

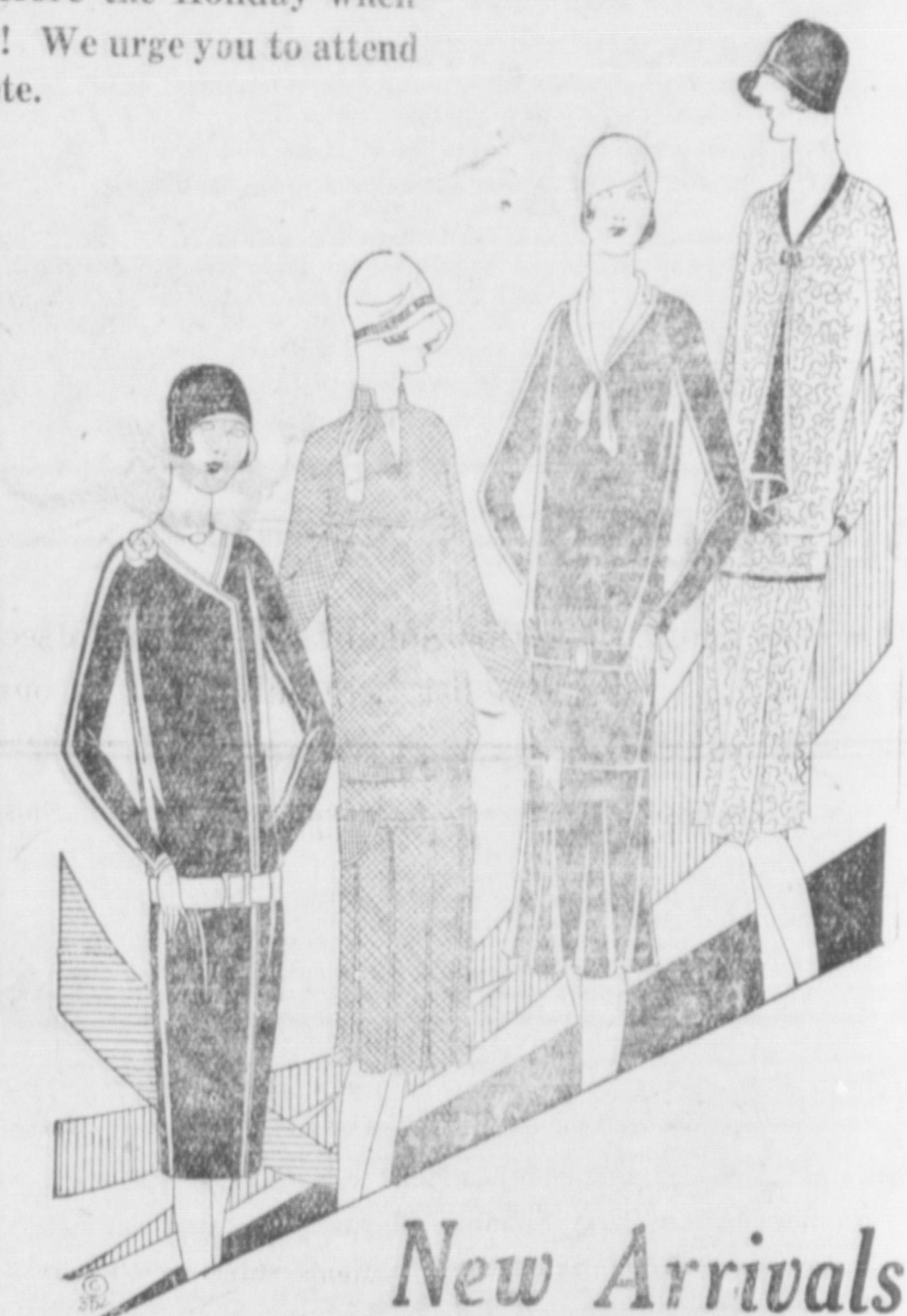
