"The Drag Net" Opens With Murder of Witness in Court Room and is Full of Excitement

A murder trial is in progress. The noose is tightening about the neck of Dapper Frank Trent, notorious gangster, suspected murderer. PROGRESS OF PRAIRIE CITY

T. H. Johnston Mentions Strides Made by Regina and Says Rupert Has Just as Many Advantages

Telling of his visit to Regina recently, T. H. Johnston, addressing the Rotary Club yesterday, said the city had a population of 57,000; the building permits for the first ten months of the year were \$46,000,000. There were thirteen new industries, 25 wholesale houses, 550 new homes and thirteen new apartment buildings and the sum of \$35,000,000 worth of farm machinery had been distributed from there in ten months. The largest building was that of the General Motors which employed 800 people and had an output of 150 cars a day. The progress of Regina was illustrative of the progress of the west. Prince Rupert should take encouragement from it for he considered Prince Rupert had even greater advantages than had Regina.

Mr. Johnston told of visiting a great many places while away. He brought greetings from Rev. Dr. Grant of Fort William, a former member of the club here and now a member of the club at the head of the lakes where his club classification was "fire insurance."

The progress of the whole country, Mr. Johnston said was remarkable. Toronto was building up rapidly.

The speaker concluded by telling of a visit to New York and Princeton University. There, a friend of his told a story of a young man securing a position in a fish house down east. He was told he must be on the job at five in the morning. He arrived at seven and on being taken to task for his late arrival said he had been there on time but it had taken two hours to find a parking place for his car. His employer looked at him severely and remarked:

"The other employees here instruct their chauffeurs to park their cars for them. Take a lesson from them."

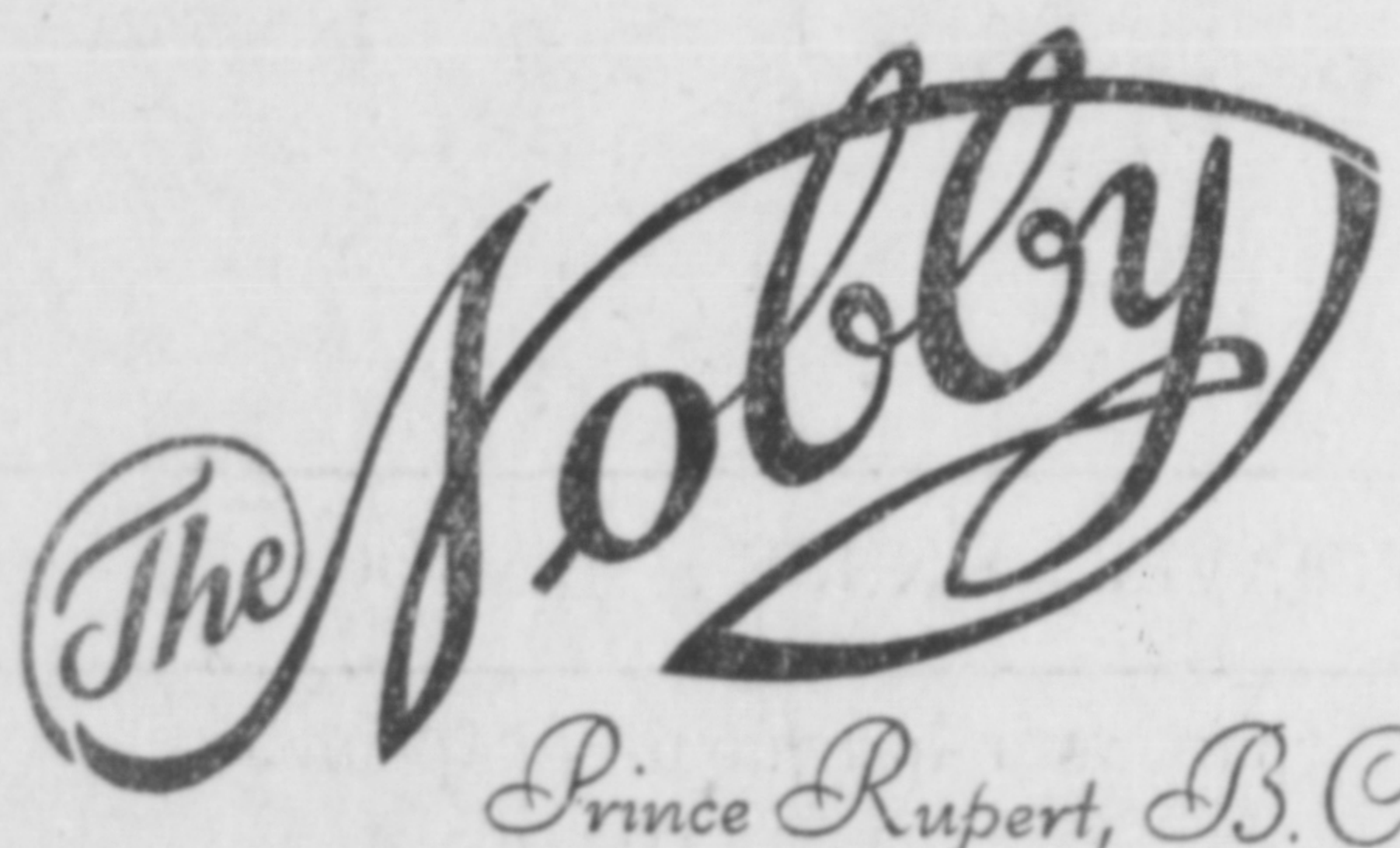
