FIGHT PROVED TO BE A DRAW

HARDING AND CLARK MIX IT IN TEN ROUND BOUT WITHOUT EITHER GETTING DECISION

With the boy from Calgary offsetting with his slugging aggressiveness any advantage that his Bellingham opponent may have had in superior boxing skill the ten round bout at the Exhibition Hall last night between Alf Harding and Ray Clark was a fair enough draw, this being the unanimous call of the referee and the two judges. The bald-headed Clark had a cleaner and more skillful action than the nevertheless rugged and shorter Clark but the latter, in usual style, carried the fight much of the way. Clark could not seem to get going in the way that many of the fans were apparently expecting and it was only toward the latter rounds that he showed signs of the style he was purported to have. He was of the direct hitting type, a boxer, while Harding kept up his reputation as a fighter. On the whole, it was a tough battle with plenty of lively exchanges and the audience of fans, perhaps not as large as the merits of the card justified, was well repaid for a good evening's entertainment.

ROUND BY ROUND

After waiting for each other, Clark put over a few straight punches in the first round and Harding responded with a couple of lively slugging attacks and, continuing to lead, was pummeling Clark against the ropes on two occasions. Clark seemed to lack pep and this was Harding's round.

Clark lived up a bit in the second round and delivered a few straight jabs and missed a few. Harding went to his hands on the floor in one rush. Clark

GOOD PRELIMINARIES

There was an attractive card of preliminaries, the opening event being a lively exhibition between Young Italy (Waldo Antonelli) and Young Scotland (Donald Kennedy). Italy was the availer while Scotland stolidly slugged.

Nina Gurvich took a decision from Tommy de Marco in a bout which was very lively in at least the first two rounds. Nina won out in the third and on points when Tommy was edged and just waiting to be hit. Nina, however, was himself so tired that he could not finish him. Quite a pace had been set.

Jimmy Sims put up a fast and fierce fight against Jack Holroyd over whom he led in all three rounds. Jimmy hit his opponent so often and so hard that he was wondering at the end of the third round what it was all about and he was game, however, and took stiff punishment in the third round with no sign of resistance. He was out on his feet and Sims was declared the winner before the time was up.

SEMI-FINAL

In the semi-wind up, K. O. Blair of Portland, Oregon, started off in a threatening manner against Tiger Boulter. Slow in the wind-up and very deliberate, Blair looked like a fast and hard hitter. As a matter of fact he was able to hit about when he wanted to be first round and had Boulter guessing. Blair stepped right out in the second and decorated Boulter's face with some vicious cracks, the latter's right eye being partially closed. In the third, Boulter's striking power held him a good steady and, while Blair was lowering up, he dealt him some of his own medicine. Boulter smashed victory at of defeat in the fourth frame and led it all over Blair, who was now tired and unable to deliver, showing signs of grogginess. Boulter was given the decision in the bout which might have been fairly called a draw.

NEITHER COULD WIN

Both boys were looking for opening at the tenth but few presented themselves. Harding attacked strenuously in the early part of the round with Clark responding fairly toward the close. This was the round in which either might have won the fight but it was even.

The referee, Pete Laporte, and the judges, W. J. Raymond and G. A. Hunter, two newspapermen, unanimous declared it a draw with three rounds to Clark, three to Harding and four even, as follows:
