London Times Says Fewer Than Ever Will Come to Canada This Year

(London Times)

There is a great deal of dissatisfaction among those people and organizations who seek to promote the movement of British settlers to Canada, over the new regulations which have been introduced by the Canadian Government in connection with prospective British emigrants. It is feared that in the coming season, as a result of those new regulations, emigration from Great Britain to Canada will be reduced by as much as from 30 to 50 per cent., and that, too, at a time when it is generally felt that everything possible should be done to encourage and stimulate British emigration to Canada.

In the past the medical examination of intending settlers had been performed in this country by a roster of British medical men, about 1,500 in number, but now the Canadian Government has set up in this country a Canadian medical staff, numbering 18, who will undertake all this work. All persoons who propose to proceed to Canada to stay, whether under assisted cchemes or at their own expense, will have to undergo a special medical examination bl one of these Canadian doctors, who will visit various centres in the country at intervals for the purpose of carrying out their work. Certain days have been allotted for the various centres. The scheme will, therefore, involve considerable delays, during which the intending emigrant may change his plans. If the examination of all the candidates cannot be Friday, Feb. 17, 1928 completed within a single day, which quite conceivable, as, at some cenres, there may be as many as 100 perons to be examined at a time, some


