AGAINST USE OF THE BIBLE IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Trustees Also Ask for Definite Ruling on Official Version of O'Canada.

PENTICTON, Sept. 25.—After a sharp debate on the question of Bible reading being introduced into provincial public schools, the British Columbia School Trustees Association convention here decisively rejected a motion introduced by North Vancouver delegates.

After discussion the trustees decided to ask the department of education to confer with various provincial authorities to settle on one version of O' Canada.


