GOOD ATTENDANCES RECORDED YESTERDAY AFTERNOON IN UNITED CHURCH AND IN EVENING AT SALVATION ARMY

TERRACE GOLF PLANS MATURE

OFFER OF SITE SECURED CLOSE TO TOWN FOR NINE HOLE COURSE AND COST BEING INVESTIGATED

TERRACE, March 8.—The golf committee reported and decided the most suitable place for a golf course was at George Little's ranch at Little Canyon, just east of town. A nine hole course could be laid out there and it was near enough town to eliminate the necessity of a club house at present, as well as a convenient distance from town to be reached by all who might wish to take up the game. It is also situated beside the railway where it would attract attention and prove an advertising medium.

The required property comprises some thirty-five acres of land on which very little further clearing would be necessary. Mr. Little had been approached and had offered to lease the property for five years at \$150 per year and if desired, renew the lease for another five years at \$200 a year. Financing proved to be a stumbling block and it was referred back to the committee for further planning and a more detailed account of initial expense and upkeep.
