Support Program To Be Renewed

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal
government has decided to re-
new its egg price-support pro-
gram for 1953.

The agriculture department
has announced support will
continue at the wholesale price
of 38 cents, a dozen for grade
A large at storage points, plus
carrying charges.

The department will buy up
all surplus eggs in storage at
the end of the year.

A few thousand cases of eggs
were found surplus in the cur-
rent year, an official said. These
were purchased by the depart-
ment at the support level and
turned back to the trade at a
slightly lower price. The govern-
ment absorbed the loss which,
said the official, was "several
thousand dollars."

Mounties Now Streamlined, Fewer Horses

The Royal Canadian Mounted
Police of 1953 are streamlined,
mechanized, motorized and fitted
with wings, radar and specio-
graphs.

They now have fewer horses
than the New York City police
department, according to an
article by Richard L. Neuberger
in the January issue of Popular
Science Monthly.

"Once we needed stablemen,
dog-masters, veterinarians and
cowboys," Inspector Edward H.
Stevens, six-foot four-inch
police officer in charge of train-
ing for the force in British Co-
lumbia, told Neuberger. "Today
our requirements run more to
mechanics, radio operators, air-
plane pilots."

The Marine Division of the
RCMP is a small navy in itself.
It has 86 craft and 212 men.
Some of the boats are mere out-
board skiffs, but others are 112-
foot cutters and 162-foot con-
verted minesweepers.

The Mountie of 1953, according
to the Popular Science article,
must be familiar with physics
and chemistry, and he encoun-
ters them in the crime labora-
tories at Regina and Rockcliffe,
which rival the labs of the FBI,
Scotland Yard and the Surete.

He learns how to record finger-
prints and how to read them. He
is taught how to operate a cam-
era. He masters ballistics and he
finds out about toxicology.

"Being a member of the RCMP
is more than being an ordinary
policeman," declares former
Commissioner Stuart Taylor
Wood, whom Neuberger quotes in
his article.

"The Mounted Police have
many detachments where only
one man is stationed. He may
be hundreds of miles from an-
other post. He must have in-
numerable skills. He may have
to be a doctor and nurse one
moment, a cook the next and
magistrate still later. And he
must have a sense of tradition
and history. That is why he
never wears a red tunic until
graduation day. He may not
wear it very often again, but it
has for him rich significance."

Despite tradition, however, the
Mounties of 1953, Neuberger con-
cludes, are convinced that more
criminal cases will be decided in
modern laboratories than on the
bleak and windswept expanse of
the Barren Lands. The micro-
scope is replacing the carbine, as
the automobile has all but re-
placed the horse, among the tools
of the vigilant troopers who in
Canada's vast realm are assign-
ed to "uphold the right."

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Sound Thinking Wins More
Games Than Card Lore

Sound thinking is more important than a knowl-
edge of the "rules" of play. This is particularly true
in the defence of a hand, where neither defender can
see his partner's cards.

Of course, a defender can try
to form a mental picture of his
partner's holding, based on the
bidding and the looks of the
dummy. Most defenders do think
pretty hard in the later stages
of a hand—after the chances of
defeating the contract have al-
most disappeared.

That is not good enough. The
thinking should start at trick
one.

In today's deal, Mr. Champion
made a fine co-operative play at
the very first trick. Against the
five-spade contract, Mr. Masters
opened his singleton heart.

Mr. Keen won the first trick
with the ace of hearts in
dummy. Now, Mr. Champion
had no interest whatsoever in
the heart suit. A letter player
might have played the deuce
without thinking what differ-
ence it could make.

But Mr. Champion thought
along these lines: My partner
and I hid diamonds and clubs.
Why the heart opening, then?
It must be a singleton and my
partner must have control of
the trump suit, with hopes of
ruffing a heart lead later.

It also occurred to Mr. Cham-
pion that when Mr. Masters did
get in with his supposed spade
winner, he would probably lead
a club. After all, Mr. Champion
had bid nothing but clubs and
he had never raised diamonds.
Yet, he had the ace of diamonds
and not the ace of clubs. In an
effort to have his partner lead
the higher of these two suits, he
played his highest heart, the 10,
at trick one.

This thoughtful play resulted
in a two-trick set. Mr. Masters
won trick two with the ace of
spades, put his partner in with
the ace of diamonds and ruffed
the heart return. Another dia-
mond trick completed the set.

Note that if Mr. Masters had
led a club at trick three, Mrs.
Keen would have won, picked up
the last trump and discarded
both of dummy's diamonds on
her long hearts—making six-
odd.

As a result of the strike settle-
