

nance Committee said: The year 1927 has been one of great activity in all departments of hospital

Those of you who have followed hospi-in the scope of work undertaken, many improvements have been made which ave been referred to by the chairman of the house committee (C. H. Elkins).

The financial statement which you have before you reveals and shows the institution to be in an easy position. In my report of 1926 I alluded to the mortgage on the Nurse's Home and expressed the hope that an effort would be made during 1927 to clear up the outstanding indebtedness. This I am glad to advise has been done, the final payment having been made on Augus. 1 of last year, exactly 15 months ahead of the time the final payment was to become due, thus both Hospital and Nurses' Home at December 31, 1927, were free of debt.

Dealing with assets, you will notice that cash on, hand and in bank amount to \$3,519.56, and accounts receivable at \$4,609.20. This latter item may not be received for some time. The statement has, however been prepared with care and has not been overestimated, in other words this asset is considered to be worth 100 cents on the dollar.

A reserve, of a book value of \$4,240 for extension of the building, and for extraordinary contingent purposes, has been set up this year. We expect to have to meet in the near future a heavy item for repairs (such as a new roof) and to take care of such a contingency the board decided to set this

On the liability side of the balance sheet, you will note there are unpaid accounts of \$1,467.97 which are now paid. Two other items totalling \$515.05, which may not be a liability but are really sums held in suspense, they appeared n the 1926 statement and we do not think they will have to be paid. (The auditor I notice is present and will, if you wish, explain exactly what these items represent).

I wish to emphasize the fact that this encouraging report is only made possible by the excellent services rendered by Miss Harrison and staff and the untiring energy of Mr. Birch, the managing secretary.

OTHER REPORTS
