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TERRACE DEALS LOCAL AFFAIRS

VILLAGE COUNCIL DISCUSSES HERD LAW, FINANCE AND OTHER MATTERS

TERRACE, April 21. — The regular monthly meeting of the village council was held in the council chambers on Tuesday evening, councillors J. K. Gordon and E. T. Kenney as well as H. Halliwell, clerk, being in attendance.

Following preliminary business a letter was read stating that if the new municipality desired to have the census of the village taken, it would be necessary to ask the attorney general's department to do the work at municipal expense.

A letter from the public works department announcing that Lazelte Ave. had been classified as a primary road and Kalum Street a secondary road was read.

A preliminary reading of the classification of roads bylaw regarding the secondary road was made.

The financial statement showed a shortage of funds to meet the accounts, a condition to be expected until taxes are due.

At a request from the board of trade that the council take some steps to have an inspection of chimneys made, and repairs affected where necessary, it was decided to have the clerk draft a bylaw covering the matter in accordance with the act and submit it at a future meeting.

The enacting of a herd law came up for discussion, several complaints having been made of the nuisance caused by cows and cow bells around the town.

Rev. George Turpin, local United Church pastor, has accepted an invitation to reconsider his resignation. He will give his decision within two weeks' time.

There was cold weather and a light snowfall in the Bulkley Valley at the first of the week.

Vancouver interests are planning to establish another moving picture show in Smithers Hall.

Capt. J. J. O'Brien of Philadelphia arrived in town this week after having spent the winter in Europe and is inspecting the progress of operations on the Victory and King Tut mines.

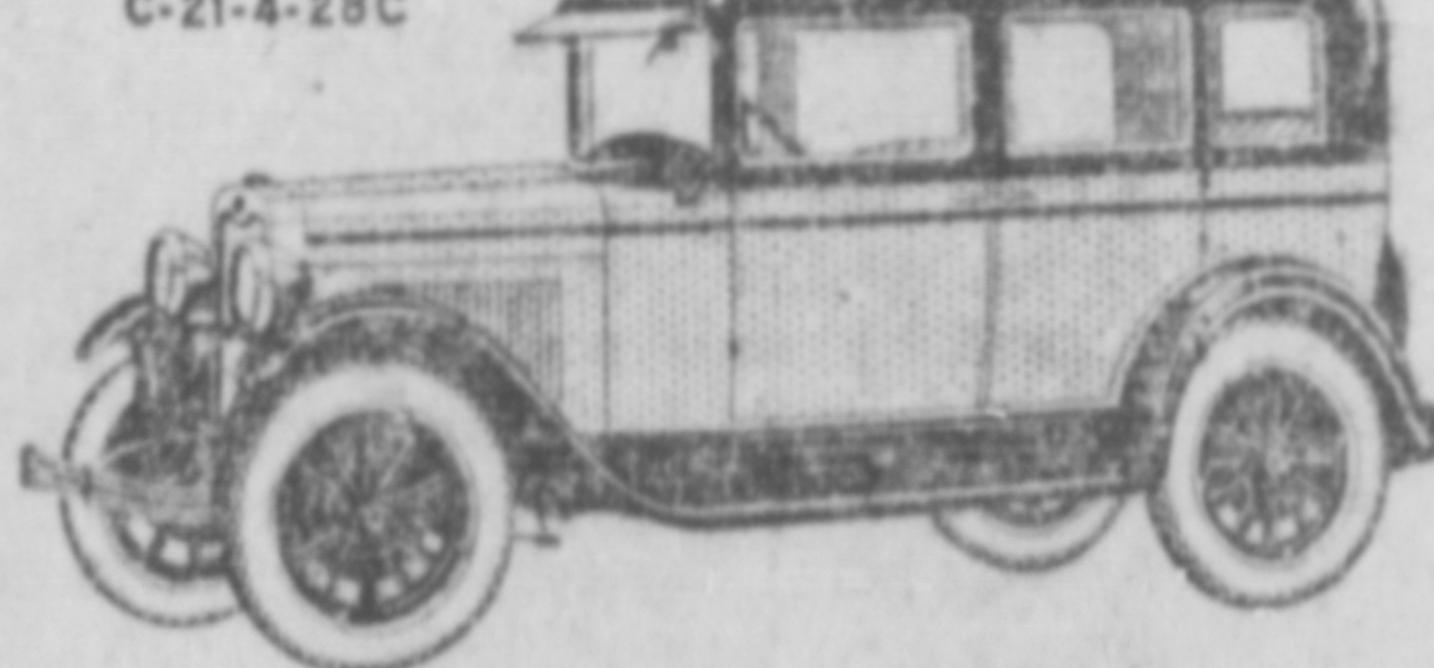
