SYNOPSIS OF  
LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed  
Crown lands may be pre-empted by  
British subjects over 18 years of age,  
and by aliens on declaring intention  
to become British subjects, condi-  
tional upon residence, occupation,  
and improvement for agricultural  
purposes.

Full information concerning regu-  
lations regarding pre-emption is  
given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series,  
"How to Pre-empt Land," copies of  
which can be obtained free of charge  
by addressing the Department of  
Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Gov-  
ernment Agent.

Records will be granted covering  
only land suitable for agricultural  
purposes, and which is not timber-  
land, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board  
feet per acre west of the Coast Range  
and 5,000 feet per acre east of that  
Range.

Applications for pre-emption are  
to be addressed to the Land Com-  
missioner of the Land Recording Di-  
vision, in which the land applied for  
is situated, and are made on printed  
forms, copies of which can be ob-  
tained from the Land Commissioner.  
Pre-emption must be occupied for  
five years and improvements made  
to value of \$10 per acre, including  
clearing and cultivating at least five  
acres, before a Crown Grant can be  
received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for pur-  
chase of vacant and unreserved  
Crown lands, not being timberland,  
for agricultural purposes; minimum  
price for first-class (arable) land is  
\$5 per acre, and second-class (graz-  
ing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further in-  
formation regarding purchase or lease  
of Crown lands is given in Bulletin  
No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and  
Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on  
timber land, not exceeding 40 acres,  
may be purchased or leased, the con-  
ditions including payment of  
stampage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20  
acres, may be leased as homesites,  
conditional upon a dwelling being  
erected in the first year, title being  
obtainable after residence and im-  
provement conditions are fulfilled  
and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial pur-  
poses areas not exceeding 400 acres  
may be leased by one person or a  
company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Prov-  
ince is divided into grazing districts  
and the range administered under a  
Grazing Commissioner. Annual  
grazing permits are issued based on  
numbers ranged, and priority being given  
to established owners. Stock-owners  
may form associations for range  
management. Free or partly free  
permits are available for settlers,  
hempsters and travellers, up to 100  
head.
