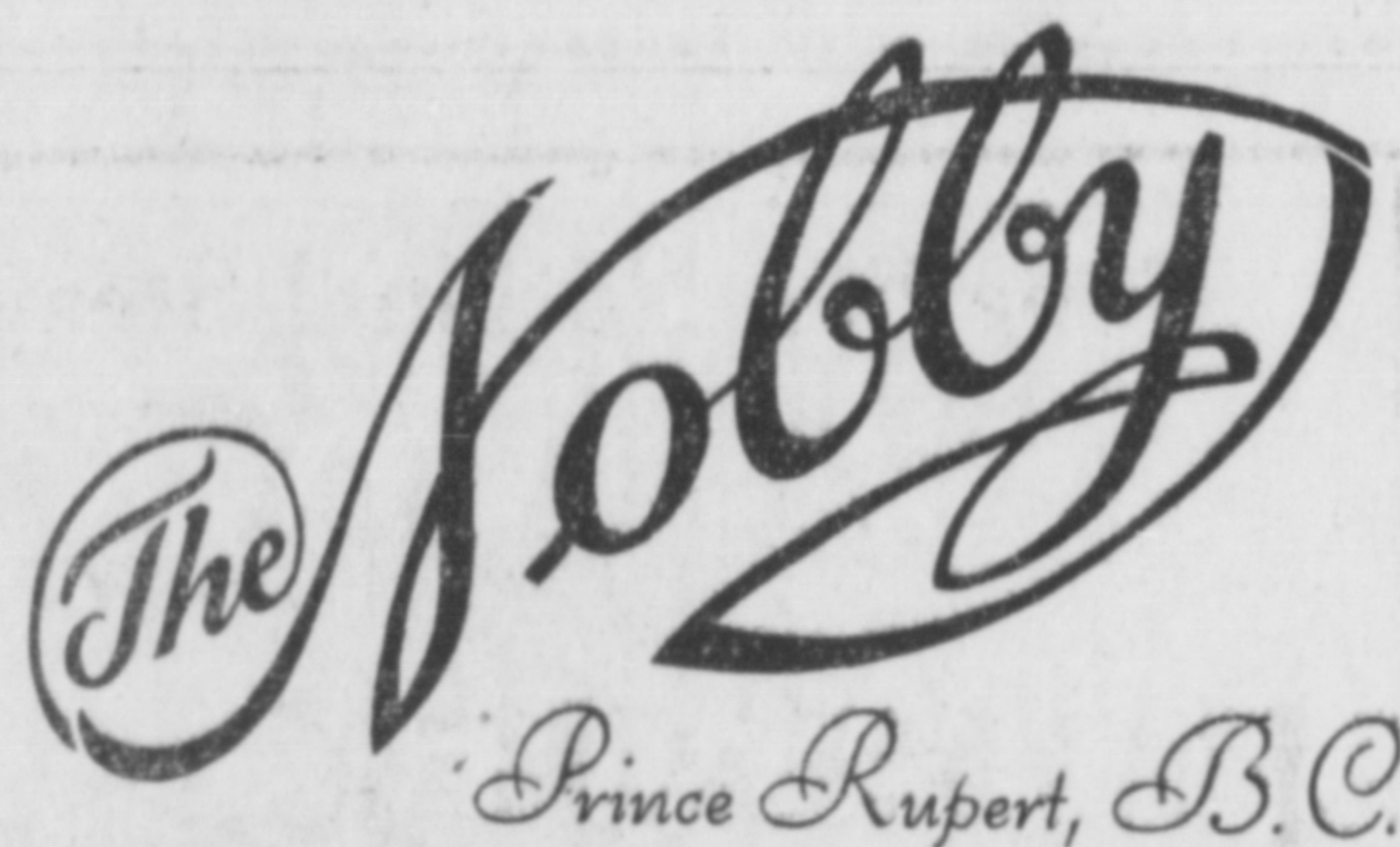

PROSPECTS OF MUCH MINING IN INTERIOR

Dr. James Suggests That Prince Rupert Look That Way for Development

That the mines to the East of Prince Rupert were of more significance than those on the coast to the development of the city and while not much at present they promised to develop into a number of important operations, was one of the suggestions made in an interesting address by Dr. J. T. James, district mining engineer, who addressed the Rotary Club yesterday afternoon, H. McLean presiding. He urged that these developments be watched and cultivated by the people of the city.

On Porcher Island too was a small property where an attempt was being made to develop a gold mine. It was coming along well and was in a fair way toward success. It would be directly tributary to Prince Rupert.

Dr. James then dealt with the Portland Canal section including Observatory Inlet. He spoke of the value of the Torice mine. While production there was not at present large, the output being about three tons of concentrates a day, it was taken only from ore broken in course of development. Underground work was showing up well and the prospects were good.

He also spoke hopefully of the Tiger and Sunrise properties and the smaller Esperanza and la Rose.

At Anyox the usual amount of ore was still being taken from the Hidden Creek mine and a tram had been built to connect the Bonanza three miles away, which is also being worked. Work on the Saddle property was stopped by snow.

In the Portland Canal region the Premier, which had been producing for ten years, was still the only producing mine. The most important of the other properties was the Big Missouri, which was much improved under the Consolidated development but which was still only partly prospected. Gold ore was encountered in two veins and the ore was still staying with them. The showings on this property were very scattered.

In the Bear River district it was not yet known whether Silverado was a prospect or a mine. They would know this winter. On Mountain Boy they had found a vein of highgrade. This property had closed for the winter. On the George two drills had been at work and crosscuts had been made. Rufus Argenta and Red Top and others were being developed.

Dr. James spoke admiringly of the work of the Premier Company in building the aerial tramway to Porter Idaho with its magnificent span of 4,200 feet across the glacier. A number of other properties were also mentioned.

Concluding, the speaker said while there were plenty of gold properties to take the place of the Premier, there did not seem to be yet a property likely to replace the Hidden Creek mine at Anyox. Yet the coastal section had been very little prospected and it was all highly mineralized. There were prospects that a real copper mine may yet be found between Anyox and Britannia.

SMITHERS IS FOR HANSON

Delegates Instructed to Support Candidate at Prince Rupert Convention

A special meeting of the Smithers Liberal Association was held in the municipal office on Thursday evening, when two dozen members met to select delegates to attend the Liberal nominating convention at Prince Rupert on November 15, when a candidate will be chosen to oppose J. C. Brady, Conservative member, at the next Dominion election.

E. Marshall Sales, who was in the chair, explained the necessity for selecting a candidate at an early date in order to allow suf-

icient time for a thorough campaign. Prior to the selection of convention delegates, several of those present spoke in glowing terms of the candidature of Olof Hanson and a motion was introduced and passed instructing the Smithers delegation to support Mr. Hanson at Prince Rupert. Several other points in Skeena riding had made similar moves, while at Prince Rupert Mr. Hanson's entry into the field has met with the approval of many promi-

nent Liberals.

Smithers will be entitled to seven delegates at the convention, while a number of others will carry proxies for smaller district centres.

Several candidates have announced their intention of seeking the nomination, including Geo. W. Nickerson, Olof Hanson and Fred Stork. The latter has been canvassing the interior during the past two weeks for support at the convention. According to Prince

Rupert reports, Mr. Nickerson would withdraw in the event of Mr. Hanson definitely entering the field, in which case the latter's appointment would be virtually conceded.

At the meeting of the School Board last night Miss Mercer, Principal of Booth School stated that, with the permission of the Board they planned to put on the usual Christmas entertainment at the end of the term.
