New Regulations Are Issued by Fisheries Department Dealing with Salmon, Herring and Clams

OTTAWA, February 18 .- As a result of the investi- England Played Fifth Round and gation made by W. A. Found, director of fisheries, amendments have been made to the regulations in the fishing industry of British Columbia. Under them provision is made for the licensing of herring pounds. The clam season is changed and so is that for fishing cod and various changes are made in the regulations for seining and provision made for closed areas. Summarized the egulations provide:

Herring pounds must be licensed.

Helpers in fishing herring seines are required to be

Drift net fishermen are required to place lights at he end of their nets at night.

Purse seine boats must have numbers on top of the lot house.

Floating traps are prohibited.

All kinds of fishing for commercial purposes is probited above fishing boundaries.

Protection of the distance about the mouths of rivers streams at which fishing may be carried on is exended from 200 yards to half a mile.

Power boats assisting purse seine boats in seining is bited as is the "open set" in purse seining.

Waste or wanton destruction of fish is prohibited. Collecting boats are not allowed to carry nets. Driving salmon from inside a closed area is pro-

Salmon purse seines are prohibited in a considerable

number of areas. Maximum length of salman purse seine is reduced om 500 to 200 fathoms, the width to be not less than

200 meshes on the basis of a 3 1-2 inch mesh. The minimum mesh for sockeye nets will be abolished after the coming season.

The close season on little neck clams is changed to ebruary and March instead of June and July and of outter clams from August to October instead of from May to September.

The close season for cod is Jnauary and February nstead of February and March, and restricted to ling

A minimum mesh of one inch extension measure for erring nets is provided instead of a fixed mesh of that

SURVIVORS OF TANKER ARE IN BAD CONDITION

Clung to Driftwood Until Picked up by Trawler Following Explosion

TOKIO, Feb. 18 .- Most of the survivors of the American tanker Chuky, which exploded and sank en route from San Pedro to Yokohama, are in a serious condition, say reports from Misaki, where a trawler landed 21 of the crew Friday.

Captain Hernes and fifteen members of the crew were killed outright. The remainder saved themselves by clinging to driftwood until the trawler picked

The crew was composed of Americans, British and Chinese.

Slipping Process Continued This Morning, Aggregate Loss Being More Than Billion

NEW YORK, Feb. 18. Stock prices, which began to slip badly yesterday, continued their downward course as height. One of the tallest Douglas firs support was withdrawn from recent pool favorites. Losses of from one to three points were general.

It is estimated that a two-day decline wiped out more than a billion dollars in quoted values, the paper loss in General Motors and U.S. Steel alone aggregating \$60,000,000.
