**MEMORIAL TO MARSHAL HAIG**

Sermon on "The Immortal Dead" Preached by Rev. J. R. Frizell

Despite extremely inclement weather, there was a good-sized congregation in attendance at First Presbyterian Church last night for a special service in memory of the late Earl Haig, commander-in-chief of the British forces during the Great War, which was held at the request of the local branch of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League, Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, the city council, First North B.C. Regiment and the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve, members of which had been especially invited to attend, were all represented in addition to the general public.

Rev. J. R. Frizell, taking as his subject "The Immortal Dead," referred at length to the career of the late Earl Haig and his service to the Empire. At the close of the sermon, the audience stood in silence as "The Last Post" was sounded by Bugler William Rance. Hymns and prayer were suitable to the occasion and the glorious dead of the great conflict were referred to as well as the widows, mothers and orphans of those who had made the supreme sacrifice.

The choir rendered an anthem, "What are These?" and there was a quartette by J. E. Davey, choir leader, J. A. Teng, Morris Blott and A. Clapperton.
