FIERCE GALE SWEEPS OVER EUROPE

CANADIAN SKATER CLAIMS BADLY USED OLYMPIC RACES

England and Sweden Swept by Fierce Gale

STOCKHOLM, February 13.—From 20 to 25 lives are known to have been taken by a furious storm which swept in from the British Isles on Saturday. Most of the casualties are reported from the vicinity of Scierland and Vestland where the gale crushed houses and barns, causing much property loss as well as the loss of livestock.

LONDON, February 13.—A fierce gale which swept the British Isles Friday night and Saturday, took nine lives directly or indirectly. Three houses were blown down in Manchester and hundreds of other parts of the kingdom damaged.

Workmen at Lydgate, Lancashire, were crushed to death by bales of hay blown over. The captain of a schooner was drowned in the Mersey River when the gale sank his small boat.
