German Doctor Sentenced For POW Experiments
METZ, France (Reuters) — A military court here has sentenced two German doctors, Eugene Haagen and Otto Bickenbach, to hard labor for life for wartime medical experiments on concentration camp victims.
The prosecutor had asked for the death sentence, claiming that the experiments had cost the lives of more than 90 Jews and Gypsies.
Both admitted they used doomed Jewish and Gypsy prisoners at the notorious Struthof concentration camp near here as guinea pigs to find means of combatting the effects of poison gas and typhus.
Bickenbach, a 48-year-old former Heidelberg University professor, said in his final statement to the court:
"I was led in a tragic and inevitable conflict, to do my duty in cruel circumstances to save thousands of lives. I wanted to do my duty and nothing but my duty. God help me."
Haagen, 52, former vice research at the Rockefeller Institute in New York, said:
"It is my habit to take the entire responsibility for my acts. Other researchers throughout the world have done what I am accused of doing. I regret having experimented in a camp, but it was war. I regret that men should have suffered, God help me."

Negro Appointed To Head Diocese
PRETORIA (Reuters)—For the first time in the history of the Roman Catholic Church in South Africa a Negro clergyman has been appointed head of a diocese.
Msgr. Emmanuel Mabhathana has been declared bishop-elect at Leribe, a Basuto land diocese.

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Technically Correct Play—Not Always Winning One

This business of defending must always be tempered with the humanics of the game. The technically correct play is not always the winning play.

The plays you make when you have a fine partner like Mr. Masters may not fit the situation where you are sitting across the table from Mr. Muzzy.

Take today's deal for example. Against the four spade contract, Mr. Muzzy led the ace of diamonds. While the chances for winning another diamond trick appeared excellent, Mr. Champion decided not to encourage continuation of the suit at this point. In other words, he played the discouraging deuce.

He made this play in the desperate hope that he could get Mr. Muzzy to shift to the ace and another club. Mr. Champion would ruff the second club and cash the kind of diamonds for the setting trick.

Mr. Muzzy shifted all right.

He shifted to the nine of hearts. Dummy's queen won and Mr. Abel took two rounds of trumps. He cashed the ace of hearts, felling dummy's king, followed with the jack of hearts on which dummy's last diamond was discarded. Now he ruffed a diamond on the board, returned a club and put in the nine.

Mr. Muzzy won with the 10 and had nothing left but clubs. There was no way to prevent Mr. Abel from winning a trick with the king of clubs.

There is no use putting a strain on a weak partner. Mr. Champion's best bet was to play the jack of diamonds at trick one. He could have won the diamond continuation with the king and relaxed. Eventually Mr. Abel would have had to lose two club tricks.

Actually, the deuce of diamonds play was no good technically, either. It was not a suit preference signal because that signal does not apply unless a shift is definitely indicated, as where there is a singleton in dummy. But with two diamonds on the board, a shift was not clearly indicated and the deuce play meant only that Mr. Champion was not interested in diamonds.

PGE Freights Start Jan. 12
VICTORIA (CP)—Freight and express service over the Pacific Great Eastern Railway's new 83-mile link from Quesnel to Prince George will start Jan. 12. Railway Minister Ralph Chetwynd said Monday.
