## UNITED CHURCH

### IN GOOD SHAPE

Encouraging Reports Covering Various Activities Congregation Presented at Annual Meeting

**PASTOR IS PRAISED**  
Debt Materially Reduced and Mortgage Will Soon be Removed According to Fore-cast

Last night the congregation of First United Church held its annual meeting. The United Church of Canada has this year brought the year end to December 31, thus making the annual meeting actually a survey of nine months' work. Rev. A. Wilson, pastor, opened the meeting with brief devotional exercises and occupied the chair during the remainder of the meeting. T. Wilding was elected secretary.

Great enthusiasm and interest was shown by the large number present which represented the various branches of young people's work as well as adult organizations.

Earl Barrie, superintendent of the Sunday school, gave an interesting resume of the work of that organization, showing a healthy state of progress.

G. W. Vandewater, president of the newly-formed Young People's Society, described the varied activities of that organization, pointing out valuable work done in helping the young people to self-expression and constructive thinking.

Miss Phyllis Harvey reported for the Pollyana Group of the C.G.I.T. and described a splendid program of activities along the line of the fourfold life.

G. V. Wilkinson reported for the ladies' aid an increased membership and a larger amount of money raised in nine months than in the twelve months previous.

Mrs. G. S. Irvine gave a most encouraging report of the activities of the Women's Missionary Society and showed it to be a vital force in the life of the congregation.

Frank Vickers, as treasurer for the congregation, showed an encouraging degree of progress in the finances of the congregation. The mortgage had been further reduced during the year and the total indebtedness of the congregation was not more than \$1,160.75. This, it is hoped, will soon be removed according to the promise reflected in congregational life at the present time.

G. S. Wilson, choir leader, spoke of the work of the choir, asking the support of friends toward the project of installing an electric blower for the organ.

Miss Irene Haddock, deaconess, gave an illuminating speech on the work of the congregation coming under her care in Primary Sunday School Mission Band, C.G.I.T., and Women's Missionary Society.

Bob Irvine reported on the Tux's Group and Bruce Stevens on the work of the Trail Rangers.

A committee of stewards was appointed consisting of G. H. Thompson, W. G. Kirkpatrick, T. Wilding, F. Derry, F. Vickers and Dr. W. T. Kergin.

It was decided to appoint a session as provided for in the constitution of the United Church and nominations were as follows: T. G. Shenton, A. R. Gordon, C. R. Bigger, G. M. Hunt, G. Wostenholme and W. B. Cornish.

Appointments to the official board were Mrs. M. Kergin, W. G. Kirkpatrick, Miss E. M. Earle and Miss M. A. Way.

J. J. Shenton voiced the appreciation of the congregation for the work of the new pastor and expressed confidence that the church would go forward under his leadership to still greater usefulness.

A short musical program followed, including an instrumental trio by Miss Swana Olsen, Archie Thompson and Billy Fuller; solo by Mrs. H. Forrest; reading by Mrs. G. V. Wilkinson; song, G. S. Wilson.

Refreshments were then served by the ladies' aid and a social time enjoyed.
