Kenney to the memory of the late James Richmond, who, until his decease, had acted as chairman of the official board of the church. Special reference was made to that courtesy and Christian charity which characterized all his dealing with his fellowmen both in church and community affairs.

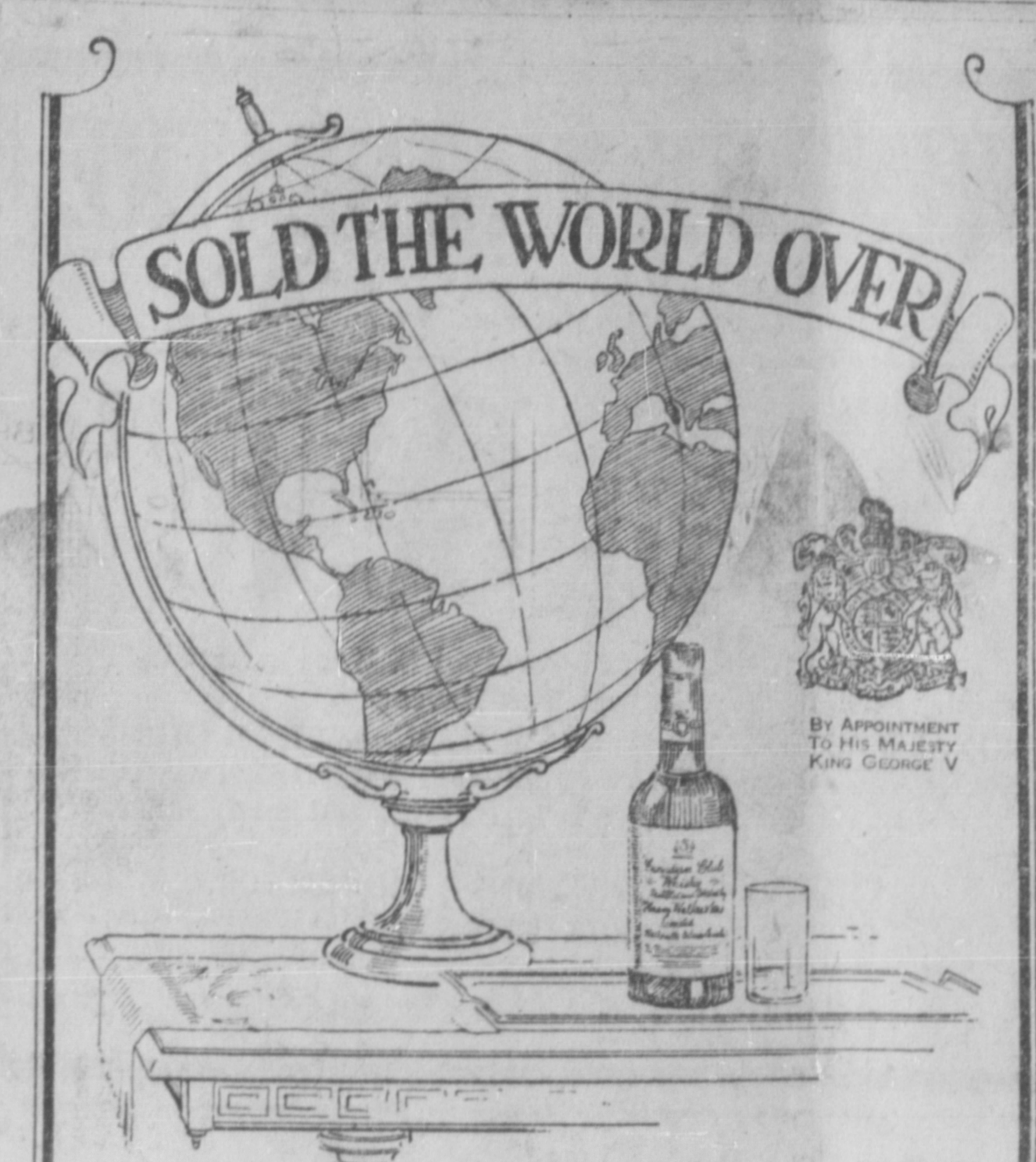
Mrs. H. Halliwell left on Tuesday to spend a few weeks with her daughter in Prince Rupert.
