Alderman Brown asked if everything vas in order and said a good many tizens fancied an order in council would be necessary to ratify the deal. Tre city solicitor explained that an act of the Legislature had been passed covering just such cases. There had been a similar case in Vancouver. Alderman Prudhomme said he did not want the bylaw to be held up, but the lane might be straightened under the same bylaw. City Solicitor Jones said it might be a good thing to have an undertaking from one property owner who might claim he was injuriously affected. Alderman Rudderham asked about the brupt turn in the lane. It was finally-decided on motion of Alderman W. J. Greer to refer the matter to the board of works and engineer for report at the next meeting of the city council on February 6.
