# MAYOR WILL GO OTTAWA SOON

Will be Delegate From City to Meet Federal Government Regarding Prince Rupert Affairs

"That Mayor McMordie be appointed as a delegate to represent the city of Prince Rupert at Ottawa before the government and present to it the claims of Prince Rupert and district as the terminus of the railway from the Peace River country to the Pacific coast." This was the text of a resolution moved by Alderman Collart and seconded by Alderman Prudhomme supported by Alderman Tinker, Brown and Linzey and passed unanimously by the city council last night.

Alderman Collart said the subject was of vital interest to Prince Rupert and the mayor was the proper person to go. He could take up various matters while there.

Alderman Prudhomme agreed that it was of great importance. They had heard of various outlets for the railway and other places had had their delegates at Ottawa.

Alderman Tinker, in supporting the resolution, inquired as to the date of leaving.

Mayor McMordie said he was not desirous of making the trip. His business here made it difficult for him to go but he would do so. However, it would be hardly possible for him to leave for two weeks. As the first four or five weeks of the session was usually taken up with unimportant matters he was of opinion that if the delegation from here reached Ottawa in three weeks it would be plenty soon enough.

Alderman Brown expressed the opinion that the citizens here must do something. To send the mayor he believed was the wisest course although he was doubtful of the success of the mission. He saw no reason for haste.

Alderman Linzey said he was rather dubious of trips to Ottawa but in the present instance thought it the best thing to do. The mayor was a personal friend of the premier and that was an advantage.

It was decided to await the report of the joint committee if the report was in before February 6. In the meantime the mayor will meet the council informally and discuss matters to be taken up at the capital.

# BRITISH VIEW OF MIGRATION

Colonel Amery Says Aim of His Country is to Help Build up Canada

EDMONTON, Jan. 19.—(By Mail)—"Migration is a purely human business. We study statistics but at the bottom of it all is the individual case," said the right Honorable L. C. Amery, addressing the Women's Canadian Club here. There are many aspects to consider, continued Col. Amery. It is a big thing for a family to pull up stakes and leave familiar surroundings to start anew in a strange country. Some of the spirit which characterizes the old timers is needed in every family leaving known comforts and setting out to carve life anew for themselves. Often the heads of families realize that they are not going to be much better off themselves, but they feel that they are going to give their children a chance.

**SETTLER'S WIFE PLAYS BIG PART**  
The main object of Great Britain, said the speaker, is to co-operate with Canada and help build up Canada. The Mother Country aims to send out men and women who temperamentally and physically are able to make a success in the country. "I am convinced that the settler's wife is the most important part of the combination. If she is to show the right spirit it will help the man through. If she is unsuitable, not prepared to make the sacrifice, in many cases a promising settler will throw up the enterprise when he has laid the foundation of success, and drift back to the cities, thereby adding to the unemployment situation. The settler's wife plays a big part in making the undertaking a success."

**TAILOR MADE GOOD**  
Col. Amery related an incident which had come to his attention after the war. At that time every settler received a farewell message with the request that he send back a story of his experiences in Canada. Many letters were received, among them one from Peace River. This letter was most enthusiastic, even characterized by a note of triumph. The writer rejoiced in the freedom of the new life, in all its possibilities, and deplored the fact that ten thousand settlers could not be sent to the Peace River country. On looking up his record it was found that this man had been a London tailor all his adult life with the exception of the years spent in war service. There are many cases of men succeeding on the land who had no agricultural experience, averred the speaker. The record of this man's wife showed that she had been on a farm in the Argentine. Doubtless the wife's experience had much to do in helping the wounded ex-tailor make good.

**URGED FRIENDLINESS**  
Turning to Canada's responsibility, Col. Amery urged his audience to help the newcomers over the first difficult stages. Make them feel they are coming among friends, that Canada from the first day is going to be a real home; help them over little troubles; help them adjust themselves to the differences between the old life and the new, he begged. A kindly word, good advice in season, will make an immense difference to them. There is bound to be a certain amount of wastage, but give the new material the best possible chance. The best chance depends much upon material things, often upon quite impalpable things such as friendly actions. Make even the difficulties of circumstances appear hopeful, the speaker pleaded; make what they might have

# THEATRE SITE BYLAW DELAYED

Sent to Board of Works and City Engineer for Report Before Next Council Meeting
