CELEBRATION FOR TERRACE

Banquet and Smoker Held to Commemorate Incorporation as Village

TERRACE, Jan. 20.—In celebration of Terrace's advent as a village under the Village Municipalities Act, a banquet and smoker was held in the Terrace Hotel on Tuesday evening, January 18, at which about sixty of the male residents of the district were present. The affair was sponsored by the Terrace Board of Trade, which body was actively responsible for the incorporation movement.

J. K. Gordon, president of the board of trade, presided over the festive board and gave the toast to the king. A toast was then proposed to Mr. Gordon and the gathering rose and sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." Later in the evening Mr. Gordon gave an interesting talk on early pioneer days and recalled many interesting incidents of years ago.

E. T. Kenney gave an instructive talk on Village Incorporation, its history throughout the province and the possibilities of improved conditions under its workings. D. D. Munro of Smithers was present and gave a talk in which he waxed enthusiastic as to the advisability of sending a combined exhibit of Bulkley and Skeena Valley produce to the provincial fair at Westminister, with a view to attracting settlers from the south.

Short addresses were also made by many other local residents and these were interspersed with vocal selections. Out of town visitors who expressed pleasure at being present and extended good wishes under the new regime were J. Curson of Prince Rupert, L. Bethune, Uak, and J. Aird of Pacific.

Ski-running, the most ancient winter sport in the world, dates back to heathen and prehistoric times, and the ski undoubtedly was originated in Scandinavia, according to the research of Professor K. B. Wiklund, the well-known Lapland expert at the University of

Upsala, Sweden, in an interesting treatise on the history of the ski and the snow-shoe. In olden times the ski sport held such an important place in the life of the Swedes that heathen mythology includes a special deity who was the patron and protector of all ski-runners. The god of the ski was called Ull, and his name is still found in many Swedish place names, such as Ulltuna, Ullevi, etc. On a rune stone in the province of Upland is seen the picture of a ski-runner, and heathen legends also contain a northern ski-goddess Skade, the daughter of giants and the wife of Njord. The original Scandinavian skis consisted of one long ski of wood with a groove in the centre and a short one ungrooved and covered with leather. The long one was used for propelling the ski-runner. In Russia and Siberia the skis were long, covered with leather and both intended for sliding in the snow.

These interesting facts about the history of the ski sports are published in the excellent year book of the Swedish Society for the promotion of the ski sport in Sweden, just out. Skiing is the most popular of all Swedish athletics, and the interest in this sport seems to be growing. Old and young in all parts of the country have taken it up enthusiastically, and a pair of ski is almost the first present given to the children as soon as they are old enough to walk. Competitions are held frequently and attract wide public interest, especially the spectacular ski jumping events. In some cases appropriations from public means have been given to provide skis for poor school children, and the teachers often take their classes out in the country on skis to instruct them in the technique of ski-running.

The popular interest in this line of sport is concentrated around the main winter sport event of the year, the Vasa Run, a long distance ski-running competition in Dalecarlia, following the historic route of Gustavus Vasa, the founder of modern Sweden when, 500 years ago, he fled on skis to save his life from his pursuing enemies, but was brought back by the Dalecarlian peasants just as he was about to cross the Norwegian frontier. This event is one of the most dramatic turning points in the history of Sweden, as Gustavus Vasa was since able to free his country from foreign oppressors with the aid of the Dalecarlians. On this occasion thousands of spectators, including members of the Royal House, go to Mora in Dalecarlia to attend the competition, in which Sweden's most famous long-distance ski-runners take part.
