ST. LAWRENCE WATERWAY TO BE DISCUSSED

Proposed Big Scheme Likely to Cause Lively Debate in Parliament

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—(By Canadian Press)—One outstanding question which will doubtless come before parliament will be that of the development of the St. Lawrence River navigation and power proposals. That it will bring on a big debate is assured. The divergent views as to the advisability of going ahead with the scheme at the present time, the large amount of money involved, the disposal of the power such a development would provide, the partnership arrangement with the United States to carry through the undertaking — all these points will be fruitful in argument.

Following the reports of the international committee of engineers on the plans to build a deep waterway from the Great Lakes to the sea which differed in that the United States experts favored one dam in the St. Lawrence River and the Canadian engineers two, the United States intimated it was favorably disposed to going ahead with the project. The Canadian government referred the reports to an advisory board which met here last week and presented its report to the government. This report will be brought before parliament and although no details have been made public as to its contents it is understood to advise the going ahead with the construction of a deep-water canal and the consequent power development along the rapids between Prescott and Montreal.

POLICE COURT FINES

The month of January was a quiet one in city police court. There was only \$300 collected in fines during the month announces Sergeant J. P. M. Hannah, chief of the district detachment of the provincial police. Of this \$300 was collected in one case of supplying liquor to Indians.

In 1920 the grand total of Canadian securities, which includes government and municipal securities, railways, industries and trade, and finance and insurance, stood at \$12,408,000,000. Of this amount Canadians held 66.3 per cent. Of the balance United Kingdom investments represented 15.5 per cent. and United States 16.6 per cent. The remaining 1.6 per cent. was held by other countries. In 1927, however, out of a total of \$15,793,000,000, Canadians had increased their holding from 66.3 per cent. to 68.9 per cent., or from \$8,225,000,000 to \$10,885,000,000. The total foreign holdings, moreover, dropped from 33.7 per cent. to 31.1 per cent. This is made up as follows: United Kingdom, 12.2 per cent., a drop of 3.3 per cent.; United States, 17.7 per cent., an increase of 1.1 per cent.; and other countries 1.2 per cent., or a drop of .4 per cent.

It will thus be seen from the above

comparisons that although the total amount of foreign capital in Canada has increased slightly since the war, the investments of the Canadian people have increased. It may thus be assumed from this record that Canadians will continue to dominate the field of Canadian investment.
