Rev. J. Gillett, Indian Agent, came here on the last boat on business connected with the mission and after staying three days hiked back to Port Clements.

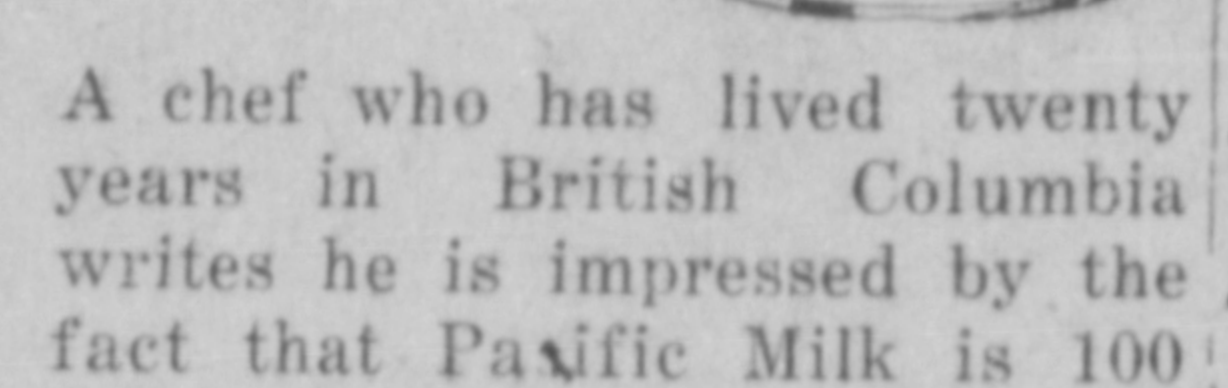
Capt. J. Haan of Sandspit who is looking after the timber limits for the Ocean Falls mill, called in last week after giving the claims the once over.

TORONTO, Jan. 28.—(By the Canadian Press)—The announcement that the Canadian Speed Skating Championships have been awarded to Toronto and that the national event will be held on Saturday, February 4, at the Varsity Rink has lived things up in ice sports in Toronto. The absence of Ross Robinson, who has left for the Olympics to represent Canada, means that a new senior champion will be made on that occasion. Roy Pendral, of Toronto who is skating better than at any time in his career, will probably rule as a favorite so far as local entries are concerned. Pendral is a speed specialist and has a habit of winning everything at his favorite distances.

Low Davis, former Old Orchard skater, now with the Toronto Club, is likely to be a serious contender. He is a long stroking skater with more than the average turn of speed. Fred Brooks and Earl Markanen should be heard from, while there is a possibility that some of the 18-year-olds may step up and make it interesting for the veterans. The most promising of the junior brigade are Alex. Hurn of London, Curtis and Charlie Bodle of the Toronto.
