REPORTS GIVEN BY SCHOOLS

FIRST EVER RECEIVED BY SCHOOL BOARD FROM HOME ECONOMICS AND MANUAL TRAINING

For the first time the school board at its meeting last night received reports from the home economics and manual training classes, these indicating that in some cases the attendance was even better than at the regular school classes, especially the manual training. The figures were closely scrutinized by the trustees and commented on. In the annual training classes attendance averages were classified as follows: Booth School, 98.53, Borden St. 97.91, High School 92.85. Averages in the home economics classes were not similarly worked out but Booth School pupils made much better attendance than any others. Regular reports from the schools follow:

Booth Memorial—Pupils attending, 457; boys 261, girls 196; average percentage 93.19. Division 10 made 97.23, Savings Bank \$88.73. During the forestry week an address was given by Mr. Gregg and the medal won by Betty Capstick for an essay on fire prevention was presented by Mr. Leighton on forestry and British Empire Week was stressed.

Seal Cove—Attendance, 63; Division I, 23; Division II, 40; the latter class being badly crowded and some of the desks too large for the pupils. The average percentage was 90.3 and sum banked \$17.50.

The trustees were thanked for a first aid kit which had already been used with good effect.

Westview—Attendance, 23; boys 11; girls 12; average percentage, 93.45. The trustees were thanked for garden tools provided and it was stated that Mr. Brown had helped with the school garden and it has been decided to plant potatoes this year.

High School—Attendance, 152; boys 80, girls 72; average percentage, 95.24. On April 9 there had been a steep decline.

TARDINESS WILL BE INVESTIGATED BY SCHOOL TRUSTEES

In one of the lower grades some time ago a case was reported to him where a little girl came late and without her breakfast and she said her mother did not get up. The High School committee of the Board will investigate the matter of tardiness at that institution, the general opinion being that there could be no excuse for it among pupils in those grades.

MR. AND MRS. STOLL OFF TO ALASKA TO JOIN THE MORRISSEY

MONTREAL, May 11.—Optimistic as to their venture into the Siberian Arctic, Charles H. Stoll, lawyer and sportsman of New York, and his wife, Mrs. Merle L. Stoll, left here on Wednesday night for Vancouver, and plan to sail from Bellingham on a fast yacht which will overtake the Edie M. Morrissey in an Alaskan port. From that time they will join that party into the Siberian Arctic. Mr. and Mrs. Stoll have been frequent visitors to Canada on big hunting expeditions. Mrs. Stoll killed two Caribou in the Gaspé peninsula when a blizzard was raging and the temperature below zero. On this trip it is hoped to secure specimens of Siberian Moose and other big game animals for the Natural History Museum, which is without specimens of several kinds.
