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News of the Mines

AROUND PRINCE RUPERT. Building Road Into Georgia River Gold Mines—Diamond Drilling Woodbine and Big Missouri—To Develop Placer Leases in Naas Valley.

Work has started on the completion of the trail from the mouth of the Georgia River near Stewart to the Georgia River Gold Mines Ltd. The work will be rushed with all possible speed so that the pack trains may take in mining equipment and supplies before the summer is far advanced. After mining commences, it is the intention to widen the trail to permit the passage of caterpillar tractors and trailers. It is believed that it will be possible to keep such a road open all winter. Development of the Georgia River mine is being watched with keen interest as some of the finest samples of gold ore ever seen in the Portland Canal district have come from that property.

Next month it is hoped to start a diamond drilling program at the Woodbine mine at Stewart to determine the limits of the known ore bodies and in the hope of locating others. An assay office is being opened at the mine, the company having secured the services of Mr. Comrie, formerly with the B.C. Silver.

Diamond drilling is being speeded up on the Big Missouri mine at Stewart. Eight men arrived at the property last week with one machine and another drill is coming at once from Ainsworth. It is understood that the drilling is to be pushed with the three machines in eight-hour shifts, the object being to explore a recently reported underground strike as thoroughly as possible before the next large payment, due in about six weeks, is made on the property.

Developments on the Northern Light property at Stewart are proving satisfactory. At present the work consists of surface exploration in the way of stripping and open cutting. One crew of men is employed in this work on the extension of the Woodbine ore zone which appears to be heavily mineralized with sulphides through which occur sections of high grade ore. This zone on Northern Light property is said to be in excess of fifty feet in width and 200 feet long, showing a vertical depth of some 200 feet. Another crew of men is employed stripping and open-cutting the central porphyry zone of the property which may prove to be co-related with the silver ore bodies on the Premier, B.C. Silver and Sebakwe.

S. P. Fitzgerald of Stewart is on a trip to Vancouver and Seattle on business in connection with the financing of placer leases recently located by his associates in the White River section of the Naas River valley. Mr. Fitzgerald and his associates have fourteen leases of 320 acres each that it is their intention to divide into two operations for the purposes of development. They are strictly a dredging proposition and it is believed a dredge could be operated on them ten months out of the year. During prospecting, values ran from a few colors up to 14¢ to the pan. The White River, in which is incorporated several other streams, heads from the northeast side of Bromley Glacier and runs in a northeasterly direction, emptying into the Naas about four miles below the mouth of Meziaden River.

Extensive developments are to be started at once on the Dalhousie mine at Stewart. W. G. Norris, consulting engineer for the company, arrived from the south at the first of this week to lay out further development work and P. C. Green, B.C.L.S., has also arrived on the scene to commence surveys for the aerial tram which will be some 4,000 feet in length, having a daily capacity of 250 tons. All material for the tram is now on the ground. The terminal will be at the railway, the opening of which will solve transportation problems. M. P. McDonald is already at Stewart to take charge of the construction of the tram. A contract has been let for another fifty feet of tunnel extension, having as its object the cross-cutting of No. 2 vein and then drifting down to a big gulch to a large sulphide zone in which high values have been obtained.

Development work on the Independence mine at Stewart is now well under way with a crew of some fifteen men employed, diamond drilling having commenced last week. The first hole is to be 600 and 600 feet long to intercept No. 2 vein at about 400 feet of depth. The property is being developed by the Revenue Mining Co.

The Silver Crest Co. will this summer construct a tram from the Saddle mine
