VICTORIA, June 6.-The Legislature of British Columbia will be dissolved immediately, probably some time this afternoon or tonight, it was announced at the Parliament Buildings today.

The date of the election will be fixed at the same time. As 42 days are required after dissolution to hold an election, July 18 or a day near it is expected to be the date of the polls.

7ANCOUVER, June 5.—Dugald Donaghy, a Vancouver barrister, former member of the House of Commons for Vancouver North, and Captain Ian Mackenzie, one of the Liberal mem bers of the Legislature for Vancouver, were last night sworn in as members of the British Columbia government, the former as minister of finance and industries and the latter as provincial secretary. The ceremony took place before Lieutenant Governor Bruce in the Court House here at nine o'clock.

### Million Spectators Watched Falsted Win Derby on Epsom Downs Today; Flamingo Second, Black Watch Third

PSOM DOWNS, June 6.—Nearly a million spectators massed on Epsom Downs today and amid intense excitement watched a rank outsider, Falstead, owned by Sir H. Cunliffe-Owen, win the Derby.

Flamingo, one of the favorites, quoted 9 to 2, came in second and Black Watch, another outsider, the betting on which was 33 to 1 against, made third place.

The winner, a 33 to 1 shot, passed the post a length and a half ahead of Flamingo while that horse was six lengths from Black Watch.

It is estimated that at least fifteen million dollars was wagered on the result, this including the Calcutta sweepstakes. The tapes broke three times before the field got away for a good start except that Royal Crusader was left behind.

Flamingo, the second choice, led all the way to Tattenham corner. Sunny Trace, also among the favorites, pressed hard, but at the last quarter Felstead drew ahead, leading the rest of of the way.

The official time was 2 mins. 34 2-5 secs., equalling the record of last year of Call Boy.

Lord Derby's Fairway, the favorite for the race, was never in front.
