WILL SIGN KELLOG TREATY IN PARIS, ATTEND LEAGUE OF NA-TIONS AND OPEN LEGATION

OTTAWA, Aug. 16-Premier Mackenzie King announced last night that he would sail from New York on the forty claims being included and the insteamer Isle de France early Saturday morning to sign the multilateral treaty in Paris August 27. It is understood he will cross the Atlantic on the same boat as U.S. Secretary Kellogg.

Charles A. Dunning, minister of railways, will sail from Quebec Wednesday and will meet the Premier in Paris. Both will go to Geneva to represent the Dominion at a meeting of the League of Nations. Early in October the Premier will open the Canadian legation in Paris and will afterwards spend a week in Britain, returning to Canada about October 15.

VICTORIA, Aug. 16.—Canadian crops will this year give her farmers two billion dollars yield and the wave of prosperity and progress sweeping from ocean to ocean across the Dominion will give remendous impetus to the country's trade and business generally, declared Dr. J. R. Grisdale, deputy minister of agriculture for the Dominion, who was in Victoria today.

"Three years ago British Columbia was importing eggs," Dr. Grisdale said. "Then she exported two cars in one year. Last year she sent between sixty and seventy cars to other parts of Canada and England This year the province already has exported between 200 and 225 cars in a period of six months.
